WEST TORONTO DEMANDS CARE IN USE OF WATER

Officials Say Population Has Out-
grown Normal Supply—St.
Barnabas to Celebrate.

WEST TORONTO, June 10.—Burg-
lars are again at work in West To-
ronto, and this time several residents
of the west end are the victims. A
lady's gold watch was stolen last night
from P. M. Grant's home on Elizabeth-
street, near Annette, while Mrs. Black's
house on Elizabeth-street, near the C.
P. R. tracks, was broken into and \$10
stolen. George Hartope and Mr. Mann
also had several minor losses, the for-
mer losing several dollars and the lat-
ter some canned goods. The police have
been notified, but so far no arrests
have been made.

Several recommendations of Supt.
McMullin of the waterworks depart-
ment were endorsed by the board of
waterworks yesterday. The board
recommended that the town be divided
into two sections, using the lawn
sprinklers on alternate nights. That
the time for the use of lawn sprinklers
be from 4 a.m. to 1 a.m. instead of
from 4 to 8 a.m., as heretofore, and in
the evening from 6 to 10 o'clock, in-
stead of from 6 to 10 o'clock, as now
the hours allowed. That street sprink-
ling be done at night as far as it is
possible to do so. On account of the
limited capacity of the waterworks,
due to the rapid increase in popula-
tion, most stringent methods will have
to be adopted to keep the water pres-
sure such that a sufficient margin can
be had in case of fire. Printed circulars
setting forth the new regulations
with regard to the use of water during
the summer months will be sent to
every house in West Toronto.

title of doctor, which one of their
number, Gordon Rice, B.A., will have
conferred upon him at the university
convocation on Friday. Mr. Rice
graduated in arts two years ago, with
honors in biology and physics and he
