

For 1908, our synod, with 12 Pres-bytenies and 280 congregations, gave sylvenes and 200 congregations, gave church, or something less than \$15 per congregation, or 5 cents per member. For 1909 we did a shade better and gave \$4590. Of this Toronto Presbysection of our church only 394 ministers are connected with the fund. These gave in 1908 \$3536. The minister's rate provides only one-third the cost of the annuity to the widow, and yet two-thirds of our ministers. yet two-thirds of our ministers are not connected with the fund, and if married, in the event of their death, their widows would have no claim on the fund."
