TORONTO'S OPPORTUNITY. Among the speakers at the recent dinner of the Canada Club of London En gland, was Mr. R. W. Perks, M.P., is actively associated with the projected Georgian Bay and Ottawa Canal. He is reported to have enlarged on the advantages the Do minion possesses in its great waterways, and to have compared Buenos Ayres with Montreal and Toronto. Twenty years ago the capital of the Argentine Republic had a population of only a quarter of a million, today it has turned the million. To accomplish this four-fold increase Buenos Ayres expended \$10,000,000. which, however, returns six per cent. interest and Mr. Perks believes the Caradian cities have the same opporthinty if they will expend the money.

With formidable competitors at home and abroad Toronto needs to be careful that the best foundation is laid for the great expansion that is evidently coming. Of the advantages which will tell most powerfully in later years none are more vital than the securing of cheap public services and utilities. In almost every large city of the United States there is seen to-day a struggle between the citizens and the private holders and operators of their franchises. New York for example has had its street railways so entangled and overcapitalized that it is impossible for them to yield a return or way corporations; Chicago is attempting to get under way with a schem that will allow tracks and rolling stock, described as only fit for the street, was arrested last night by Descrap heap, to be replaced, and many other cities are involved in similar

Toronto has had bitter experiences of its own with regard to private company management of its services and utilities. Not that alone, but it has also learned that regulation and control even when expressly stipulated for and apparently completely safeguarded, is impossible and inoperative. Reclamation of its franchises and their operation in the public interest exclusively is at last being recognized as the only effectual method of securing the chean and efficant services that mean so much for the prosperity of a modern city. At the present moment Toronto can place itself in an impregnable position as regards the future supply of Niagara electricity by remaining steadfast in support of the power policy of the provircial government. If this opportunity be lost Toronto will to that extenhandicap itself in the civic race.
