University Schools defeated De La Salle 18 to 6 in the first of the home-and-home games, for the right to enter the junior O. R. F. U. semi-final at Varsity Stadium yesterday afternoon. The winners displayed some excellent work by the back division and it was this department that turned the victory.

Both lines were strong and not much ground was gained via the bucking route. Munro, of hockey fame, was the bright shining light for the winners. He showed good bucking ability and pulled off some beautiful runs. He has a pretty style of warding off the tacklers.

Irwin was another big ground-gainer for U. T. S. and went over for the first two tries by clever dodging runs. De La Salle showed a good tackle line and an excellent kicker in McCurry. U. T. S. showed more polish.

There were many minor injuries and several disputes on the side-lines that delayed the contest. The players showed earnestness in their tackling, and this resulted in the injuries. Referee Hewittson had a busy session keeping the players within the rules.

U. T. S. lost possession several times early in the game by interference. Once they settled away they showed a nice exhibition.

No score resulted in the first quarter. At half-time U. T. S. led 6 to 0, and it stood 18 to 6 for the winners at the three-quarter point. The final was 18 to 6.

It was even in the first quarter, with both sides showing a nice open game. McCurry booted over, but Munro kicked it out in nice fashion. Irwin and Munro putted good runs and McCurry did the same stunt for De La Salle.

PARKDALE TURN IN OVERTIME VICTORY

Defeat Humberstone and Tie Up Western Senior High School Group.

The high school rugby finals set for next Friday may get a setback. Technical qualified for the senior final by putting away Jarvis, 18 to 4, in the eastern section, but the western division is far ahead from declaring a winner. Parkdale sprung a surprise by downing Humberstone in overtime, and this now leaves these two teams tied. There is another angle to it.

Oakwood and Harbord were scheduled to meet, and with the result of the Humberstone-Parkdale clash a win for Oakwood would make it a three-cornered tie. Oakwood and Harbord postponed their fixture, claiming that the Oakwood grounds were unavailable. The league president was not notified and as a result a special meeting of the league has been called and the matter will be thrashed out. This may result in two more games being necessary before a winner of this division can be declared.

Humberstone's defeat by Parkdale provided one of the most thrilling games of the year. Parkdale went into overtime to get the victory, 2 to 2, and it was a red-hot contest from the drop of the hat.

Both lines were air-tight and the scores were all made one point at a time. Humberstone led 1 to 0 in half-time. Each team scored a point in the third quarter. Parkdale forced a rouge in the fourth quarter to tie it up and succeeded to the dead line in the first five minutes of overtime to win the game. Excellent passing and running by both back divisions featured the game and the catching was faultless. In the overtime period Humberstone put Parkdale into position to score the point. Humberstone lost possession for interference, and then Parkdale booted over for the winning point.

Technical and Jarvis provided an interesting tussle in the other senior game played. Technical defeated Jarvis, 18 to 4 and earned the right to enter the final. They were evenly matched as far as weight went, but the excellent booting and running by the Tech. halves turned the tide.

Garrett was the star of the game. He did some grand kicking and was the biggest ground-gainer. Bantone went over for a try and kicked a drop goal. Everett was the pick of the lofers as he did some nice running.

The Jarvis halves were outkicked. Jarvis had the wind in the first quarter and booted four points here. It stood 18 to 4 for Tech. at half-time, and the final was 18 to 4.
