

GERMANS AGAIN FAIL IN WEST

Paris, Oct. 22.—German troops last evening made an unsuccessful attack upon certain French positions near Gienchy, according to an announcement made by the French War Office this afternoon. They were also very easily repulsed in the valley of Spouche.

Topolobampo, Mexico, Oct. 21.—A detachment of troops has been ambushed by Yaqui Indians in Sinaloa, and forty-four of the soldiers were killed. The Indians then piled the bodies on a railroad bridge and, setting fire to the latter, destroyed all. The band consisted of 180 Indians.

TRAVELERS' PLATOON

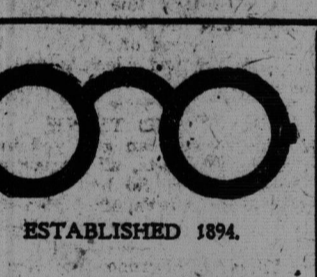
