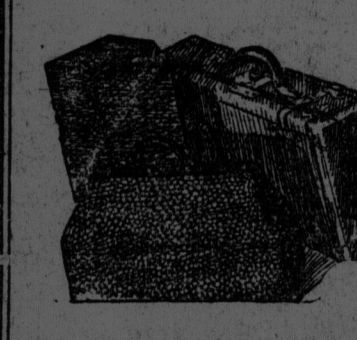
IN THE COURTS

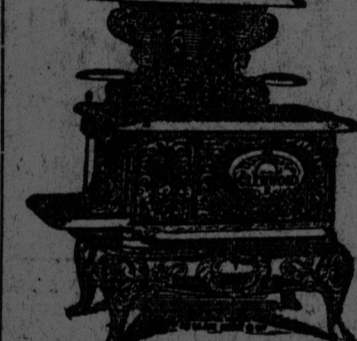
