ACTION WEEK ON POWER CO. RATES

Likely Equal or Go Lower Than Hydro, Says Mr. Pooler.

The local Board of Directors of the New Brunswick Power Company will meet on next Wednesday to take final action on the new light and power rates according to M. A. Pooler, general manager while in conversation with a representative of The Times-Star this morning. He said that the new rates will probably be as low if not lower than the present hydro rates. He said he was in receipt of a telegram from the board of directors of the Federal Light & Traction Company, directors of the New Brunswick Power Company's plant, saying that they had held a special meeting on Tuesday and had unanimously approved of the recommendation submitted by himself and Messrs. Allison and Peterson when they met with the members last week. Speaking of the extension of the street railway line from Barnhill corner, Fairville, to Moore's hill on the Manawagonish road he said that the heavy rain storms had held up the work, but aside from this satisfactory progress is being made.

The replacement work from the foot of Fairville to Tilton's corner, Lancaster, is also being pushed forward and should be completed in the near future. There is no other extension or replacement work planned for this year, but the programme will be continued next year.

GET READY FOR THE WINTER WORK

City Completes No. 5 Trestle Operations—Other Work at Wharves.

The city work on No. 5 trestle has been completed, it was said this morning by G. G. Hare, city engineer, and the harbor department is now putting in the eight inch cast iron pipe which is to carry the water supply for Sheds 5 and 6. At No. 3 trestle all the work has been completed except the laying of the rails but the C. P. R. has yet to place ties and stringers and the McLeod and Pettinfill warehouses has been completed and the crew are now working on the rest room. This should be completed within two weeks it was said. Good progress was reported with the work at Ingham wharf and work will be finished in about ten days.

MAY CHOOSE CHAIRMAN.

Another matter to come up is the recommendation of the engineer that the hydro lines be extended to the Isolation Hospital, the Board of Health having applied for this service.

THE HALIFAX NIGHT TRAIN

A. C. Barker, superintendent of transportation of the C. N. R. Atlantic region, stated in Moncton today that he "had heard nothing about it" when asked as to whether the night train service was to be restored between Halifax and St. John. The Maritime Express was suspended in Moncton following the failure of an engine between Mont Jolie and Riviere Du Loup.

FUND STILL GROWS.

The Times-Star today received some more money for the fund for the babies and the total is now about \$1,000. The new donations are \$6 from a baseball game played by insurance and fire insurance teams on August 28, \$3.88 from Masters Harold Macdonald and Frank Macdonald, proceeds of a sale; and \$1 from two little girls, "Christina and Anne," sent to the fund. The fund will be closed tomorrow.

BURIED TODAY.

The funeral of John LeRoy was held this morning from O'Neil's undertaking parlors to the cathedral for high mass at 10 o'clock by Rev. Raymond McCarthy. The body was taken on the noon train to Hampton for interment.

WILL VISIT ST. JOHN.

J. A. Thomas, fire marshal of British Columbia and president of the Fire Marshals' Association of Canada, is on his way east and is expected in St. John soon. He will spend a day here and will be in touch with H. H. McLellan, New Brunswick's Fire Marshal, and will then visit friends in Kentville and other places in the maritime provinces. He will later go to Toronto for the annual meeting of the Dominion association of which he is the head. Mr. McLellan will likely attend the Dominion meeting.

INQUEST THIS EVENING.

A late report from the General Public Hospital this afternoon was to the effect that Allan Currie, 18-year-old son of the late H. L. Currie who was killed recently in a motorcycle smash-up, was resting quite comfortably and is expected to recover.

IS GIVEN FREEDOM

Edward Greer, a 19 year old youth, who was taken into custody yesterday on a charge of stealing coal from a car on Forest street siding, the property of the General Public Hospital, was brought before Magistrate Henderson this morning and pleaded guilty. He was informed that the other two boys who had been reported could not be located and his case would be dealt with. Magistrate Henderson said this was the first time he had been brought to court for violating the law and he would take that into consideration and allow him to go on a suspended sentence. He told him to go along with his father and in future to be a good boy and not do anything that would result in his reappearance in the court.

NEW DIRECTOR OF C.N.R. VISITS CITY

R. H. McKay Found Maritime Much Talked of in U. S.

R. H. McKay of New Glasgow, who was recently appointed a director of the C. N. R., arrived in the city today en route to his home after a short trip to Boston and Providence. Referring to the various C. N. R. problems, Mr. McKay said that he was not in a position to discuss them at present as he pointed out he was gassed to this office only about a month ago and he had a very thorough grasp of his new work as yet.

Concerning conditions in Nova Scotia, Mr. McKay said that the steel and coal mining industries were not very busy at present and said that this affected the general prosperity of the province. The apple crop and the increased price for fish should help conditions this fall.

While in the eastern states, he said he had been pleased at the numerous words of commendation he had received from tourists who had visited these provinces during the last few years. He said that they were unanimous in their praise of the roads and their treatment while here. There was a slump in business at present in the states, he noted, but declared that the people expected a sharp revival following the election next month.

Mr. McKay said that he expected that his duties would often bring him to St. John. He left on the afternoon train for his home in New Glasgow.

LETTER FROM JAIL BRINGS FREEDOM

Man Gets a Chance to Go Out to Pick Potatoes.

"If you will let me out of jail and give me a chance to go to Aroostook County where I know I can get working potatoes I will return the favor some time" was the text of a letter received by Magistrate G. A. Henderson yesterday from a man serving a two months term in jail on a drunkenness charge. After reading the letter the Magistrate looked into the case and learned that the man had served three weeks for the same offence. He gave him the chance he desired and issued instructions to release him.

W. U. APPLETON IS NAMED PRESIDENT

St. John Men Attend Meeting of Railway Employees' Association.

Walter U. Appleton, general manager of the C. P. R., Atlantic region, was on Wednesday elected president of the Railway Employees' Association at the 38th annual session, held in Moncton. Fred W. Robertson, general manager agent of the region, was elected vice-president; W. F. Sears, auditor, and J. T. P. Hestis and George Peters, members of the standing committee. J. J. Chandler, F. T. Yeomans, G. C. Elliot, H. J. Hennessy and R. H. Whitney, St. John, attended the meeting.

GETTING MARION MOSHER READY

The work of preparing the schooner Marion Mosher for her trip across the bay to Meteghan is progressing rapidly. The men employed in the work were busy this morning replacing the rigging. J. F. Deveaux, who has secured the contract to overhaul the schooner, was supervising the work this morning.

The sails and rigging have been stored in a loft over the office of the Great West Wine Company and are being taken back to the vessel today. The auxiliary engines are being overhauled. The vessel is to proceed to Meteghan under her own sails. The rigging and sails are said to be still in good condition.

Mr. Deveaux said this morning that he was not sure as yet how soon the vessel could get away but added that it would probably be within a few days. He declared that he did not know who the new captain of the schooner would be on the trip across the bay. Captain William Breen, who was in command when the schooner came here, is now in charge of a schooner of his own. There will be no delay at the Customs in clearing the Marion Mosher except for the registering of her new captain, a customs official said today.

WAS A PIONEER

The funeral of John Strilchuk, one of the members of the St. John Window Cleaning Company, will be held tomorrow. The body has been at Chamberlain's Parlors, Mill street, awaiting arrangements made by a fraternal organization, whose local officers will supervise the burial.

Mr. Strilchuk was quite alone in his country. He was a native of Roumania and came to St. John nearly 13 years ago. By steady industry he built up the profitable business, now so familiar to citizens at large. In a small way, therefore, and in a not unimportant branch of civic workday activity, he and his co-workers have helped make St. John a brighter, cleaner better-looking place.
