AN IMPORTANT MEETING TODAY

Lloyd George and Barthou Confer in Genoa

British Premier Ready for Home, is One Report, Unless Outcome Favorable—Little Entente Declared to Favor Adjournment to a More Suitable Time.

Genoa, May 6—Whether the meeting between Mr. Barthou and Lloyd George would open the way for liquidation of the vital issues remaining before the conference was the question animating all Genoa today, following two days of lagging interest. Mr. Barthou telegraphed that he wished to see the British premier as soon as possible after his arrival this morning from Paris.

Other questions to be talked over by the two leaders are the non-aggression pact proposed by Lloyd George, and possibly the great problem of the German war reparations. Unless an adjustment can be reached by Monday, the representatives of the Little Entente nations, it is said, will propose adjournment of the conference until a later date, when there is greater possibility of agreement.

Genoa, May 6—Russia's reply to the allied memorandum expected to be ready on Sunday or Monday, will be a distinctly conciliatory document, not intended to break off negotiations, Foreign Minister Tchitcherin said today. It will, however, he declared, firmly state Russia's inability to comply with the terms offered.

SOME IMMIGRATION TROUBLES IN WEST

Saskatoon, Sask., May 6—Speaking to an audience of the G. W. A. here last night Bishop Lloyd of Saskatchewan referred to reports that 5,000 acres of the land in western Saskatchewan, abandoned by the Menominee, who migrated, had been purchased on behalf of a colony of 1,000 Polish settlers, who it is understood, will come to Saskatchewan in the near future from Chicago.

LIKELY TOTAL LOSS ON COAST OF NOVA SCOTIA

Halifax, N. S., May 6—The schooner Strathcona, eighty-nine tons, is ashore to Bull's Rock, Fisherman's Harbor, Guysboro County, and will likely be a total loss, according to word reaching here. The Strathcona is owned in Prince Edward Island, she sailed from here for Port Hawkesbury early this week.

ONLY TWO IN NEW BRUNSWICK

Toronto, May 6—The number of failures in the dominion as reported by R. G. Dun & Company during the last week was sixty-five. Ontario contributed sixteen, Quebec twenty-two, Manitoba nine, Alberta seven, Saskatchewan two, British Columbia four, Nova Scotia 8, New Brunswick two.

GIRL RESCUED FROM FARM SHED

Was Held Prisoner by Her Father, Who Said She was Mentally Unbalanced.

Bucyrus, Ohio, May 6—Irene Menges, aged twenty, was rescued yesterday by the sheriff from an iron shed on the farm of her father, Jacob P. Menges, near Crestline, where she is said to have been imprisoned for two years. The girl was brought to Bucyrus, where she is being cared for by the sheriff's wife. She has not spoken a word since she was released.

CHANCELLOR ON BIG QUESTIONS

Sir Robert Home Addresses Primrose League—Ireland, Budget, Europe.

London, May 6—Sir Robert Home, chancellor of the exchequer, in an address yesterday at a demonstration by the Primrose League in Albert Hall, said the government had not had time to bring forward legislation designed to strengthen the House of Lords, but this promise would be fulfilled soon.

FINDS TRACES OF ARSENIC

Examination of Stomach of Fifth Husband of Woman Suspected of Murders.

Cleveland, May 6—Examination of the stomach of the fifth husband of a woman suspected of a series of murders in order to collect \$11,000, has revealed traces of arsenic, so Assistant Chemist Voreg reported yesterday.

U. S. SHIPPING BOARD PROGRAMME COMPLETED

Washington, May 6—The shipping board's building programme established as a consequence of the world war, and involving an expenditure of \$3,500,000, was completed yesterday with the acceptance by the board of the steamer Western World, one of the board's 525 foot vessels, was built by the Bethlehem Shipbuilding Corporation.

DEVASTATION BY EARTH WAVES

Buildings in Corato, Italy, Destroyed—Town Built Over Subterranean Body of Water.

Rome, May 6—Corato, a city in Southern Italy, about twenty-five miles from Bari, was visited again yesterday by "earth waves," which in the past have caused much damage there. Buildings extending for almost a mile were demolished and the 50,000 inhabitants carrying their belongings, are seeking refuge in nearby towns.

CHINESE WAR APPEARS AT END

Tien Tsin, May 6—General Wu Pei Fu, victor in the civil war, which now appears to be at an end, is reported to be at Huangtung, on the Peking-Tien Tsin railway, about ten miles south of the capital, where he went yesterday afternoon from Fengtai. The retreat of General Chang Tso Lin's forces now appears to be nearly at its end, except on the Tien Tsin-Peckow line, where it is estimated from 30,000 to 40,000 men will remain in the vicinity of Machang. Orders for these men to evacuate have been received, according to Chinese reports.
