

MUCH COAL YET TO BE UNCOVERED IN CAPE BRETON

Prediction of Large Stores
There and in Cumberland
and Pictou Counties.

Gloucester, N. S., Feb. 25.—"I believe coal seams as yet unknown will be discovered in Cape Breton, in Cumberland and in Pictou counties," said T. J. Brown, mining expert, at a recent meeting of the Nova Scotia Mining Society.

Mr. Brown, who has collected an amazingly complete compendium of data covering every feature of the exploitation and development of the coal deposits of Cape Breton Island, is recognized as perhaps the keenest observer of conditions and details respecting the Sydney coal fields in Nova Scotia.

Charles J. Mitchell, consulting mining expert with the Dominion Coal Company, holds a similar opinion to that expressed by Mr. Brown, and the notion that perhaps vast stores of "black diamonds" lie in undiscovered treasure houses of Nova Scotia is born out by the well-founded suppositions of other mining engineers who have studied the Bluenose deposits.

Ever since 1897, when Sir William Dawson, director of the Geological Survey of Canada, suggested that "there may be large areas of coal hitherto undiscovered not more than fifteen miles from Louisbourg Harbor," explorers of the Cape Breton coal fields have been successful in prospecting and undertaking the development of new outcroppings of coal in the section about Sydney, North Sydney, Sydney Mines, Louisbourg and Glace Bay. Within recent years the district immediately about Sydney and the country lying between Sydney and Glace Bay has given evidence of surprisingly rich deposits, and several private mining enterprises have found it, if not Eldorado, at least "a very good thing."

"The Dominion Coal Company," says the Glace Bay Gazette, referring to probable developments of the coal fields of Cape Breton, "has planned extensive new developments for the immediate future. Had it not been for the unavoidable delay in the consummation of the British Empire settlement, contemplated developments of the coal fields of Cape Breton would have been quite near realization. The next half decade will surely witness for Nova Scotia progress that will tend to make the pioneers of Cape Breton coal mining fields turn in their graves."

NEWMAN CLARK'S CASE RESERVED

Ottawa, Feb. 25.—The Supreme Court of Canada today reserved judgment in the case of Clark vs. the Queen, in an appeal brought from the appeal court of New Brunswick. It hinges on the ability of a trial judge to charge a jury that the prisoner must prove insanity, where such a plea is used, "beyond a reasonable doubt."

This case is that of Newman Clark, of Four Falls, convicted of shooting and killing Miss Phoebe Ball at Grand Falls on March 25, 1920.

WAS OF GREAT ASSISTANCE TO CANADA

High Commissioner Perley
Presides at Banquet to British Railwayman.

London, Feb. 25.—(Canadian Press, by mail).—James Wright, who recently retired from the service of the London and North-Western Railway Company after forty-two years' work, was entertained at dinner at the Hotel Cecil recently by friends in railway, shipping, emigration and theatrical circles, among them several Canadian, who gave him an illuminated address, which is to be followed by the presentation of a grandfather's clock.

Sir George Perley, high commissioner for Canada, who presided, said that the fact that Mr. Wright had managed to keep so popular with the public for over forty years was a proof of his good nature and sincere desire to be of service to everybody. Mr. Wright had successfully handled the Canadian passenger agents' work for many years, and in that capacity he had been of great service to Canada. He had charge of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association's tour fifteen years ago and he managed it to the satisfaction of everybody. He also piloted Canadian school teachers through this country, and he had been of great service to the tour of the Empire Parliamentary Association delegates from Canada. During the war he greatly helped the British military authorities in their various transport troubles. Mr. Wright had also arranged successfully for the transportation of thousands of Canadian immigrants, including those sent out by Dr. Barnardo's Homes and the Salvation Army, and he was instrumental in bringing about the improved facilities for passenger traffic between the railway station and the docks.

James Glover paid a tribute to Mr. Wright's work for the theatrical profession in such matters as the provision of special trains. Sir Herbert Tree, he said, one day received a Royal command to appear at Ballarat, which threatened to interfere with an opening night in Dublin. The telegram was private and confidential, and Sir Herbert Tree, "with true theatrical instinct," showed it to everyone in the club smoking-room. One of his friends remarked, "Any fully-developed idiot when he gets a telegram like this would send for Jimmy Wright." (Laughter.)

Sir Thomas Fisher mentioned that Mr. Wright entered the railway department about the same time that the Canadian Pacific Railway extended its enterprise to England and that Canadian immigration began to develop. It took him two years' hard work to get special trains for the boats. Mr. Wright was spurred on to this by the competition of Southampton. He hoped competition would be maintained in spite of all the ministrations of transport.

WORLD OUTPUT INCREASED IN 1920

Total Production 689,000,000 Barrels, a Gain of 28.6 Per Cent. Over 1919—Consumption Also Grows.

Petroleum production of the world in 1920 amounted to 689,000,000 barrels, according to a compilation by R. L. Welch, general secretary of the American Petroleum Institute, in his annual report. This compares with a total of 557,500,000 barrels in 1919, or a gain of 28.6 per cent. The output from the United States amounted to 443,402,000 barrels, a gain of 17.4 per cent over 1919, when the amount was 377,719,000 barrels.

The year 1920 commenced with a domestic production in the United States at the rate of 401,183,216 barrels, based on the daily output, and ended with a total production at the rate of 402,088,586 barrels. The output for the year was a gain of 409,403,262 barrels, while at the close it reached a rate of 402,088,586 barrels.

The output of crude oil in pipe lines and field storage, it is stated, have constantly been diminishing in relationship to consumption. A total of 487,779,000 barrels represents the consumption of oil by refineries in the United States during 1920, while stock on hand at the close of the year amounted to 137,000,000 barrels, or 81.3 per cent of consumption. NURSE SETS 3 FIRES TO GET EXCITEMENT

Miss Hickey, Employed in a Brooklyn Dentist's Office—Blaze Imperilled 100.

(New York Times.)

Admitting that she had started three fires in the offices of Dr. H. C. Parker, a dentist, at Gates avenue and Broadway, Brooklyn, because she wanted some excitement, Miss Mary U. Hickey, a nurse, was held in \$5,000 bail yesterday on a charge of arson. Thirty families were driven from their homes on Tuesday by the fires, which united in a \$5,000 blaze, and firemen were able to save the building only after a fight of more than an hour.

"I don't know what made me do it," sobbed the nurse when she was accused by the police of the Ralph avenue location. "Something flashed through my mind that made me want excitement and well, I got it!"

The fireman to reach the burning building told Thomas Brophy, fire marshal, that there was something suspicious about the origin of the fires, and he detained Miss Hickey, Dr. Parker and two other dentists, Dr. Arthur R. MacKenzie and Dr. George Webb.

"This is one of the saddest cases that has come to my attention in my fifteen years as fire marshal," Dr. Brophy said. "Here is an educated woman seized with an impulse and desire for excitement who sets fire to a building and imperils the lives of 100 persons."

Fire Marshal Brophy made a charge of arson against the nurse, and Magistrate G. D. Dodds set bail for her at \$5,000. Corroborating affidavits were filed by Mr. Brophy, Dr. Parker, Dr. MacKenzie, and Dr. Webb by Dr. MacKenzie. Bail was put on a piece of property valued by him at \$25,000.

Miss Hickey told the police she had studied dental surgery in a Boston college, but was unable to obtain her certificate when she came to this state. She became nurse for three dentists, and was paid for her services. She said she was young and good looking.

PRICE DEFLATION MUST CONTINUE

Concluding an article in which he presents reasons why prices generally must go still lower, a staff correspondent of the Journal of Commerce says—

"What this means is that the average individual today cannot afford to live on the money he is earning. The cost of living is so high that it is impossible for the average man to maintain his standard of living on the wages he receives."

He will be interested, and possibly surprised, to find them so few. Whether we like it or not there is no prospect at all of putting up prices again to where they were last year. Indeed they will have to decline still further yet. That is the only way to save the situation. Prices must inevitably follow the course as, history tells us, they have followed after great wars. Whatever upward tendencies may be observed in anything like the near future, they will be spasmodic and short-lived. Incomes generally are entering on the downward grade. Prices will simply have to do the same thing. There is no other way. They will have to go down until in comparison with the salaries, wages and pure power of the general body of the people, there is a condition precedent to the bringing price deflation to this standard of living. From where there is no escape. The wise merchant is the one who can read the signs of the times and govern himself accordingly. We all know that, in nearly all lines of raw materials, there is no genuine shortage. In some lines, there is actually a super-abundance. But, speaking by and large, a merchandizing policy of low prices and yet narrow profit margins is a condition precedent to the resumption of the normal flow of goods from the factory to the store and from the store to the home."

RE-ESTABLISHMENT OF GOLD STANDARD

Financial Expert Says That of Britain Must Be Restored to Remedy Financial Position.

London, Feb. 25.—(Associated Press Correspondence.)—Need of restoration of gold standard in Great Britain was emphasized at a meeting of gold currency Association recently held here.

Sir George Paish, financial expert who visited the United States about a year ago, said the financial position of this country would not be sound until the gold standard was restored. "We could then be able to pay for things we require from other countries in goods or services without needing credit operations and without fearing the gold drain from this country," he said. "The gold standard of Europe must also be reestablished. We will not be able to resume the gold standard here until we are able to put out new capital abroad to the extent of \$400,000,000."

D. M. Mason, who presided, said the Chancellor of the Exchequer had estimated that he would have at the end of the fiscal year a surplus of \$284,000,000 which he proposed to use for the reduction of the public debt.

Mr. Mason suggested that if \$500,000,000 or \$1,000,000,000 were set aside for the purpose of gradually redeeming the redundant currency, in a comparatively short time there would be parity of exchange between Great Britain and the United States and other gold standard countries.
