THE PANAMA CANAL TOLLS ANNOUNCED

No Reference to British Protest in Proclamation Issued by President Taft

Washington, Nov. 13.—President Taft tonight issued a proclamation fixing the rates that the foreign shipping of the world shall pay for passage through the Panama canal. The proclamation, made under authority of the act passed by congress in August, establishes a merchant vessel rate of \$1.20 per net ton of actual carrying capacity, with a reduction of forty per cent on ships in ballast.

The provisions of the proclamation are as follows:

- 1.—On merchant vessels carrying passengers or cargo, \$1.20 per net vessel ton of actual carrying capacity.
- 2.—On vessels in ballast, without passengers or cargo, forty per cent less than the rate of toll for vessels with passengers or cargo.
- 3.—Upon naval vessels, other than transports, colliers, hospital ships and supply ships, fifty per cent displacement ton.
- 4.—Upon army and navy transports, colliers, hospital ships and supply ships, \$1.20 per net vessel ton.

The secretary of war will prepare and prescribe such rules for the measurement of vessels and such regulations as may be necessary and proper to carry this proclamation into full force and effect.

American coastwise shipping was exempted from toll payment by congress. It was to this provision of the act that Great Britain diplomatically protested, but no reference to the incident was made in the president's proclamation.

American naval vessels are exempted without specific mention either in the act or in the proclamation, because the authorities believed it unnecessary to explain the uselessness of payment from their own department pocket to the one belonging to the treasury department.

The rates named in the proclamation are practically the same as those which will be in force at the close of next year.

LIVES LOST WHEN STEAMER FOUNDEES IN ONTARIO WATER

Ottawa, Nov. 13.—Nine lives are believed to have been lost on the steamer *Mayflower* last night soon after 7 o'clock, when the old wheel steamer *Mayflower*, a small fifty foot boat, was wrecked on a rocky point near Barry's Bay, after springing a leak.

Of the twelve people aboard, ten of whom were passengers, and two members of the crew, three passengers, namely Gordon Peever, J. S. Imlach and J. M. Harper, all of Ottawa, and commercial traveler, are alive to tell the story of the terrible disaster. They were found late in the night by a search party who rowed out from Barry's Bay, on an island about three miles down the river, in a very exhausted condition. They were immediately taken to a nearby farm house, and there they are receiving every possible care and attention.

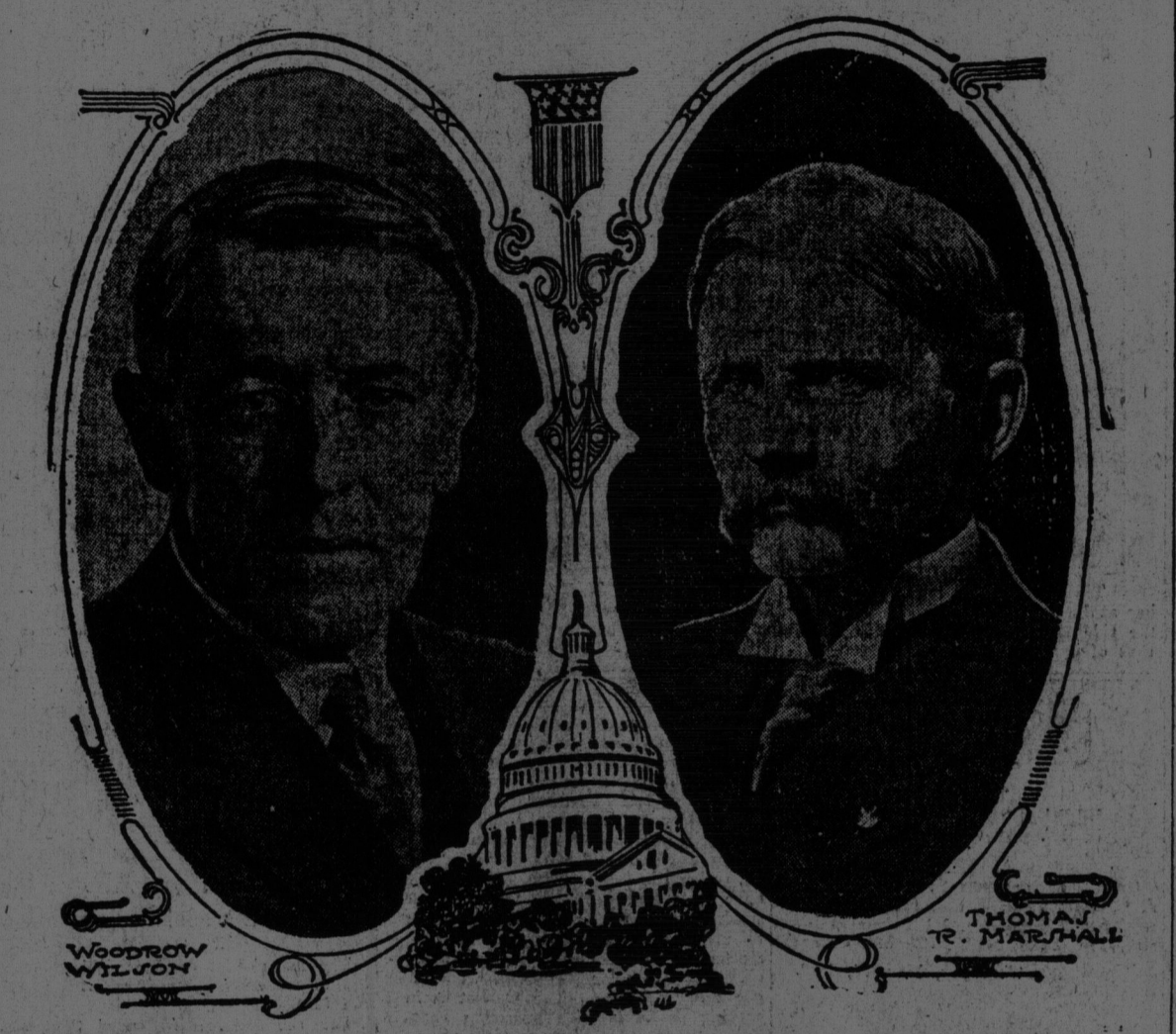
Albert county—James A. Steeves to be commissioner of parishes of Coaticook civil court, in place of A. W. Leeman, resigned.

ASSOCIATED CHARITIES

The October Report—Child Protection Act and Stinking Pool. That it is Needed

The Associated Charities met yesterday afternoon. Some new members of the board were present. In the absence of W. S. Fisher, Rev. G. F. Scovil presided. Progress was reported in the matter of the appeal for a Child Protection Act, and a committee appointed to appear before the city council in reference to the annual grant.

The secretary's report showed 315 applications to the board in October. There were fifty-seven applications for employment, but only two men were included in this list. There were fourteen applications for relief. The secretary made two or three visits, and clothing was given to some applicants. The report showed generally a fairly busy month.

There was some discussion about two families in the city, where action is urgently needed for protection of children, but the board is powerless because there is no Child Protection Act.

The secretary reported supplying information to those in Montreal who are endeavoring to organize a board of Associated Charities in that city, and it was agreed that if her presence there were desired to address a meeting she should endeavor to go.

A very striking case showing the need of district visiting was stated. A woman with several children was taken to the hospital. Her husband drinks. The father was given to a member of the board, and three ladies are seeing to it that the children are not neglected. It will be some time before the mother is well again, and but for the action taken by the ladies the children would doubtless have suffered much.

UPROAR IN THE BRITISH PARLIAMENT

Premier and First Lord of Admiralty Struck With Missiles

SPEAKER ADJOURNS HOUSE

Unionists Make Such a Clamor That Business is Suspended—They Are Trying to Force the Government to Resign

London, Nov. 13.—The house of commons, the popular house of the "mother of parliaments," was the scene tonight of a riot over Premier Asquith's proposal to rescind the action of Monday, when the Unionists carried by a majority of 22, Sir Frederick Bantury's amendment, defeating the most important financial feature of the home rule bill.

The Unionists refused to permit the debate, and the speaker was forced to adjourn the session on account of the disorder. This is an extremely rare necessity and the situation is considered a critical one.

The Unionists almost unanimously threaten that they will continue to make business in the house impossible unless the prime minister accepts the amendment or drops the home rule topic. They declare that his action is unprecedented and will be obstructed by unprecedented measures. Their object is to force the government to resign.

The uproar far exceeded that which Premier Asquith's speech when he introduced the home rule bill, and has not been equalled since the free fight over Gladstone's first home rule measure. The ministers were taunted with epithets like "traitors," "apes."

Sir William Bull, Unionist for Hammer-smith, was ordered from the floor for repeatedly calling Mr. Asquith "a traitor."

Plot Baffled.

After adjournment the Unionists doubled up programmes and threw them across the floor at the prime minister. Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, was hit with a heavy book, hurled from the camp of the enemy. A fight ensued.

FREE SEEDS FOR FARMERS

By instructions of the honorable minister of agriculture a distribution of superior sorts of grain and potatoes will be made during the coming winter and spring to Canadian farmers. The samples for general distribution will consist of spring wheat (5 lbs.), white oats (4 lbs.), barley (5 lbs.), and field peas (5 lbs.). These will be sent out from Ottawa. A distribution of potatoes (in 3 lb. samples) will be carried on from several of the experimental farms, the Central Farm at Ottawa supplying only the provinces of Ontario and Quebec. All samples will be sent free, by mail.

Applicants must give particulars in regard to the soil on their farms, and some account of their experience with such kinds of grain (or potatoes) as they have grown, so that a promising sort for their conditions may be selected.

Each application must be separate and must be signed by the applicant. Only one sample of grain and one of potatoes can be sent to each farm. Applications on any kind of printed form cannot be accepted. If two or more samples are asked for in the same letter only one will be sent.

As the supply of seed is limited, farmers are advised to apply early, but the applications will not necessarily be filled in the exact order in which they are received. Preference will always be given to the most thoughtful and explicit requests. Applications received after the end of January will probably be too late.

All applications for grain (and applications for potatoes) should be addressed to the Dominion Cerealist, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa. Such applications require no postage. If otherwise addressed delay and disappointment may occur.

Applications for potatoes, from farmers in any other province should be addressed (postage prepaid) to the superintendent of the nearest branch experimental farm in that province.

HOW BRITISH GOVERNMENTS HAVE GONE OUT OF POWER

Lord Palmerston's ministry, defeated by a majority of 19 on a vote of censure, resigned immediately, February 19, 1858.

Lord Derby's ministry, defeated by a majority of 13 on vote of want of confidence, resigned next day, February 27, 1859.

Earl Russell's ministry, resigned June 25, 1866, in consequence of a minority of 12 on the budget bill.

Lord Salisbury's first ministry, resigned on January 27, 1886, in consequence of a majority of 79 on the Irish home rule bill.

Mr. Gladstone's third ministry, resigned July 20, 1886, in consequence of a majority of 39 against his Irish home rule bill.

Lord Salisbury's second ministry, resigned August 12, 1892, in consequence of a minority of 40 on Mr. Asquith's motion of want of confidence, August 11.

Lord Rosebery's only ministry resigned June 21, 1895, in consequence of a minority of 7 on a vote of supply.
