**X-RAY SKIRTS**

Mayor of Portland Orders Arrest of Every Woman Wearing One

Portland, Ore., Aug. 22.—Mayor Albee today ordered Police Chief Clark to have every woman arrested who wore "X-ray" dress in the streets. The mayor said the order must go into effect immediately.

The action of the mayor followed his observations during a trip in the downtown district.

### AN IMPORTANT SUIT

British Columbia Financial Firm Brings Suit Against "Saturday Night"

Vancouver, B.C.—The Canadian Home Investment Company, Limited, whose head office is located in this city, have brought suit against the Toronto "Saturday Night," and have obtained from the Supreme Court of British Columbia an order for the issue of a subpoena writ of summons for service on the Saturday Night, and on Mr. Paul, the editor, in Toronto. This writ will be served in Toronto and the case tried in Vancouver. Confidence is expressed by the company of obtaining full redress as far as the court can grant.

**KEITH PUTS STOP TO CHEAP JOKE**

Suffrage No Longer Subject for Comedians on Stage of Well-Known Circuit

(Woman's Journal)

B. F. Keith has issued peremptory orders to the managers of his two score theatres throughout the United States to suppress all ridicule of the woman suffrage movement.

Mr. Keith has become a zealous believer in votes for women, and in his order to his managers points out that it is time to put an end to the disrespectful habitually paid women by American comedians. As president of the United Booking Office, Mr. Keith will use his influence to make sure that no vaudeville managers throughout the country.

Popular songs deride women in many instances and many time honored variety jokes make light of wives and mothers, and give witty auditors the impression that women are merely subjects for low comedy. The mother-in-law joke was barred in the Keith houses last winter along with certain violent epithets. From now on Keith vaudeville will give a cold reception to comedians who seek to make laughter by libeling at women, either in the family or in suffrage work.

**SULZER SAYS HE WILL RUN FOR MAYORALTY**

Threatens to Give Boss Murphy and His Tammany Candidates the Fight of Their Lives

Albany, Aug. 22.—Governor Sulzer said to friends today, whether he is found guilty or acquitted by the court of impeachment he will enter the mayoralty contest in New York city, and make the fight of his life against Charles F. Murphy and his Tammany candidates.

"I do not fear the trial at the hands of the court of impeachment," declared Governor Sulzer to one of his friends, "and I have a satisfactory explanation for these charges. But no matter what the decision of the court, I intend to vigorously enter the New York mayoralty campaign."

"I shall review the life history of Charles F. Murphy as it has never been reviewed before, and not only will the people listen to me but the newspapers will print what I say. Murphy is making a hero and a martyr of me and the children of the future will be reading of me in their school books as they do now of Hastings and Johnson."

Governor Sulzer is chafing under the restraint imposed upon him by his counsel and is declaring to his friends that the hardest part of the situation is the refusal of counsel to permit him to talk while his enemies are getting all the publicity in attacks which he is not allowed to answer.

**"BACK TO SOIL"**

Booker Washington Says Colored People Must Teach Each Other

Philadelphia, Aug. 21.—"Go back to the soil; for the sake of your health and your posterity, go back to the farms; go back now before the land and the opportunity is gone."

This is the message Booker T. Washington brought to the delegates of the National Negro Business League at their fourteenth annual convention here. Dr. Washington said:

"Our object is to bring together the men and women who have been successful and let them tell the story of their success in their own way."

"If a white man were to address a gathering of colored men to tell them of his means of success the negro instinctively feels that his success is due to his color and the lesson falls, but when the speaker is a negro the listeners say to themselves, 'If this man was successful why can't I do the same thing?' and their ambition is kindled."

Dr. Washington added that the negro has better chances in the south because he supplies most of the skilled labor.

**New Use for Rubber**

It is predicted that with the output of the plantations yearly increasing rubber will be put to many new uses. One authority thinks that before long the flooring of every new public and commercial building will be covered with rubber in some form or other; the article deadens the sound, it is more sanitary and it wears longer than any other material, and it pays over and over again the initial cost. The warblers today and the large mercantile steamers use a very large amount of this commodity, and he thinks that every other article will have rubber in place of other articles in use today as a substitute.
