GOULD WILL NOT
PAY UNTIL HE IS
FORCED BY COURTS

**Creditors of Former Wife Continue
To Pester Him Though He Pays
Her \$36,000 a Year**

New York, Mar. 1.—Although he is paying his former wife (Katherine Clemmons) the substantial sum of \$36,000 a year, Mr. Gould continues to be pestered by her creditors, who insist that he settle some of the old outstanding accounts of his one time spouse. Testimony was taken this week in actions brought against him by a number of French jewelers who demand payment for something like \$50,000 for jewels furnished to Mrs. Gould in Paris just prior to and soon after their separation in the French capital.
Gould has refused to pay on the ground that he had never ordered the material and that it was well known at the time most of it was delivered that he had left his wife and had made her an allowance for her own separate maintenance. Ever since his wife secured the limited divorce from him he has been in receipt of bills of all kinds from milliners, furriers, dress-makers, hotels and a number of other purveyors to the follies of the file rich, for goods supplied to her.
When he gets through the annoyance of contesting the endless litigation which his refusal to pay these claims has precipitated, he will regard himself as a tired man. As his income is about \$700,000 a year, it will not hurt him financially if he has to liquidate all of these debts. The report he feels that he has been used as a "good thing" thing along and he says he'll be hanged if he pays one cent until the court makes him.

CARPENTERS' WAGES

Sir,—With reference to the proposed move of the carpenters of St. John for a wage increase on and after May 1, I wish to say that I consider there is no probability of such a move. The carpenters are mechanics so poorly paid, or so much abused, that at the present time they are not likely to demand a portion of their work. Some of them might be inclined to argue that if some men are able to live on less than \$2.00 a day, why cannot the carpenter live on his present wage. Such people do not give sufficient amount of thought to the matter.
In the first place a carpenter is under a very heavy expense. He has to look after his family and he has to pay for the most modern and up-to-date tools, and so he is in a position to render the very best service. This taken together with the need of unemployment and low time on account of unfavorable weather, reduces the carpenter's \$2.50 a day to a most miserable pittance, sufficient only to secure him the barest existence.

AUSTRIA TO SPEND
\$55,000,000 ON NAVY
IN NEXT SIX YEARS

Budapest, Feb. 28.—The Austrian delegation and the Hungarian delegation which are sitting today adopted the naval estimates, including the extraordinary expenditure of \$11,000,000 for battleship construction. The government programme provides for the outfit in the succeeding six years of 865,000 tons for war ships. The construction of a fleet of first class battleships is contemplated.

NOVEL SCHEME TO
SOLVE SERVANT GIRL
QUESTION IN GOTHAM

**President of Art Society Devises
Plan of Public Kitchen in Every
Block of New York**

New York, Mar. 1.—Charles Rollinson Lamb, President of the Municipal Art Society and one of the foremost architects of New York, threatens to solve for Gotham's sorely oppressed housewives the increasingly pressing servant girl problem. A few years ago it was possible to get a tolerably good house worker, newly landed from the other side, for \$12 a month. The minute they reach the Barge Office at the Battery today a horde of relatives and friends get hold of them and make their heads swim with tales of American extravagance.
Although they may not know how to cook anything but potatoes and may never have seen a beefsteak or a roast in their life, they demand \$20 a month as a minimum and \$25 as a maximum salary to start with. Mr. Lamb's idea, if generally followed out, would ease the situation.

He proposes to have a kitchen for each square block, with one head chef and two or three assistants. The long open space in the back yards of the houses will be turned into a huge culinary department, connected by telephone with each apartment and dwelling in the block.

The housewife can telephone there her order for the various necessities of the hour and the number to share in them. Each family will pay cost price for what it consumes.
