HOPE TO HAVE EARL HAIG SPEAK HERE

Plans for New Bowling Alleys at Saint John Headquarters.

The report of the recent conference of the Dominion executive of the G. W. V. A. was presented at the monthly meeting of the Saint John branch last evening in the association rooms in Wellington Row and aroused much interest among the members.

The report stated that legislative recommendations presented to the Federal House at the present session would include the bill which failed of enactment during the 1924 session and the recommendations of the Bolson Royal Commission already considered by the House of Commons.

The conference also dealt with plans for the Dominion G. W. V. A. Convention which will immediately precede the bi-annual convocation of the British Empire Service League under the chairmanship of Earl Haig at Ottawa late in June.

In observance of the eighth anniversary of the founding of the G. W. V. A. as a national organization, the local branch decided to hold a "birthday party" on April 15 and appointed Dr. Irving, J. V. Shea, H. Robert, the president and secretary as a committee to co-operate with the entertainment committee in preparing for a big "get together" of members and ex-servicemen generally.

The efforts of the provincial president, Rev. F. M. Lockary, to have Earl Haig visit Saint John during his attendance at the B. E. S. L. convocation were approved and if Earl Haig can be brought to Saint John the local branch intend holding a big public meeting at which he will present the aims and objects of the British Empire Service League.

May Add Four Alleys. The sports committee reported the winning of the Inter-Association League championship for the second year by the association bowling team, and that the team had been entered in the Maritime Provinces championship tournament in Moncton next week.

A committee was appointed, under the connership of the president to report on the project of adding four new alleys to the association's present alleys in time for next season's bowling.


The house committee reported work under way on rebuilding the lawn in front of the building and considerable work in the way of repair on the building itself.

Halifax Dock Had 45 Ships In Year

MONTREAL, April 7.—During the year 1924 the dry dock at Halifax was occupied 224 1/2 days, which was not quite as much as in the previous year, but 45 ships registering an aggregate of 165,492 tons, were docked says the Bulletin, published by the British Empire Steel Corporation.

The marine railway at Dartmouth showed a decline in numbers, but 228 vessels registering 59,659 tons were hauled out and occupied the slips, an aggregate of 412 days. Although there were fewer vessels than usual their combined tonnage was greater than the tonnage hauled out in the two previous years. The dock and slips are in better condition than they have been for a long time, the Bulletin says.
