MAY LEAD TO TROUBLE.

France Won't Recall Marchand.

CLAIMS THE FASHODA DISTRICT—GREAT BRITAIN REFUSES TO EVEN DISCUSS THE CLAIM.

London, Oct. 10.—The foreign office has issued a Fashoda blue book, giving the correspondence between the French and British governments. It extends over a long period and exposes an interesting state of affairs. France wants to dispute Great Britain's right to the district surrounding Fashoda, and will not recall Lieut. Marchand from British territory. On the other hand, France refuses to even discuss France's claim, and will not recognize Marchand in any official capacity. What the outcome will be it is hard to say. In the meantime the Anglo-Egyptians are in possession of the country, while Marchand is only allowed there on sufferance.

On September 15, the book says, the British reported the despatch of his expedition to Fashoda, fully confirmed the announcements already cabled to the Associated Press, including the fact that Gen. Kitchener's arrival there prevented a second Dervish attack on

Marchand. The French officer notified the British that he had concluded a treaty, which he had sent to France for ratification, whereby the Shilluk had placed themselves under French care. Marchand replied in the negative to Gen. Kitchener's question whether he was prepared to resist the holding of the Egyptian flag, but he maintained that he had orders from French government to occupy Fashoda. On the departure of the British force Gen. Kitchener notified Major Marchand, in writing, that all transportation of war material on the Nile was absolutely prohibited.

The British concludes:—"The chief Shilluk came to our camp and positively denied that they had concluded any treaty with Marchand, while all the Shilluk declared their allegiance to the British government. Moreover, Marchand was in such a precarious position that nothing could have prevented his annihilation by the Dervishes had we been a fortnight later in crushing the Khalifa."

Other despatches indicate that M. Delisle declined Great Britain's request for the immediate withdrawal of Lieut. Marchand, and that Great Britain agreed to despatch a message to the French Government as a matter of courtesy, without accepting any responsibility for the results it might entail, and still maintaining that the matter admitted of no compromise. In the final despatch appearing in the blue book, Lord Salisbury, under date of October 3, instructs Sir Edmund Monson to inform M. Delisle that the letter's message to Major Marchand has been sent, but that Great Britain views the Marchand mission as having no special significance whatever.

LIBERALS ELATED.

Are Now Counting on a Defeat For Prohibition.

Thinks Final Returns Will Show It—What a Detroit Paper Says—

Detroit Free Press.

Members of the Liberal party throughout Canada are very much elated over the prohibitive vote. From present indications, they claim, it appears that there will be a small majority against the prohibition. At first it was believed that the measure had carried by at least 30,000 majority, but as the returns from outlying districts have come in, this majority has been reduced to less than half that figure, and the Liberals are of the opinion that when every vote is counted, the bill for total prohibition, throughout the country, will be defeated. If this should be the case, it will help the present government, and before the next Dominion election, Laurier promised the temperance people that he would submit the question to the vote of the people of Canada, and if it were carried by a substantial majority he would submit to parliament a bill for total prohibition throughout the country. The temperance people voted for the Liberals on this understanding, and Laurier was forced to submit the measure to the people. He did not wish to carry, as it would mean a loss in revenue to the Dominion of nearly \$10,000,000 yearly should the prohibition carry. This amount could not be collected through other channels, and the government would, therefore, have a deficit. The members of the cabinet, four in number, from the province of Quebec, held no vote against the prohibition, and as a consequence will give at least 70,000 majority against the prohibition. This will greatly assist in counterbalancing the majorities for the measure in other parts of the Dominion, and it is thought that the liquor dealers have won the day.

AT CHRIST CHURCH.

Very Appropriate Harvest Thanksgiving Services—Some Good Singing.

Special harvest home services were held in Christ church yesterday. The altar and chancel were bowers of pretty flowers, palms and plants interspersed with the golden straw of the ripened wheat and barley. The fruit of the tree and the vine hung amid the garlands of flowers and of grains betokening a plentiful harvest.

The Reverend Canon Davis occupied the pulpit both morning and evening. In the evening he took as his text the 1st verse of the 92 Psalm: It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord. TRAIN BURNED UP. THEY LET HIM OUT

Engineer and Fireman Both Died a Few Hours Before.

Strange Coincidence at Leamington—N. C. R. Roundhouse Destroyed.

Leamington, Ont., Oct. 10.—At 2.30 yesterday morning the N. C. R. roundhouse here was completely destroyed by fire. The conflagration was one of the largest that this town has ever seen. The devouring flames as they rose in billows of smoke lighted up the sky and made a beacon visible for miles around. The firemen were out at the first alarm but were powerless to cope with the flames. They devoted their time and energies to keeping the fire from spreading to the surrounding buildings. The whole town turned out to watch the fire. The night watchman, Alex. Barrie left for his home about 12 o'clock. He stays all night every night except Saturday night, on which evening he goes home at 12 o'clock. When he left at the usual time everything was all right. He was asleep at home when the fire was discovered. An engine, coach and baggage car were destroyed. These composed the branch train which runs between Leamington and Comber. This is peculiar feature in connection with the destruction of this train. Engineer Cowles and Fireman Collier who have been running on this train for a great number of years died Friday and Saturday, while the train they ran on was destroyed Sunday morning. This is looked on as a most peculiar coincidence and superstitions here think it really uncanny.

COUNTERFEITER JOHNSTON GIVEN AN HOUR WITH HIS DEAD CHILD.

An Affecting Scene—The Prisoner Also Allowed to Attend the Funeral.

Detroit, Oct. 9.—Prosecuting Attorney Fraser issued an order yesterday for the temporary release of David H. Johnston, charged with counterfeiting. By that order the prisoner was to be given in charge of Deputy United States Marshal Cash P. Taylor, and the order meant much to Johnston. It allowed him to return to his home on Twenty-sixth St. and witness the funeral services over the remains of his beautiful young daughter, Irene.

On Tuesday last Irene Johnston died. She was 12 years and 6 months old. She had been suffering from an abscess, and a cold had developed blood poisoning. But those who knew the family say that the worry of the child over her father's disgrace went far toward her death. On Wednesday afternoon Johnston was permitted to go up to the house to see his dead child. An officer accompanied him, of course, and the scenes at the house were most affecting. Irene was her father's favorite child. She was bright and beautiful, and his affections were centered in her. When he came to see her lifeless remains there laid out for burial he broke down completely. Deputy Marshal Taylor allowed his prisoner to remain with his family and their dead for some time, and when at last the time came that the prisoner must go back to the jail Johnston was much affected and kissed the cold face of his dead child again and again.
