ABOUT GLORIA.

In the editorial columns of the American Horse Breeder of the 18th inst. the following appeared the name of Gloria.

"Those who watched the game mare Gloria in her work at Combination Park the first of this season, when her owner, Frank Fox, was putting her in condition for championship racing, were surprised to learn that the daughter of Ethan Wilkes won the free-for-all at St. John, N. B., on August 14th, and the Simasse (2:08-1/2), and lowering the track record from 2:17-1/2, made two years ago by Phoebe W. (2:08-3/4), to 2:16.

"If we remember correctly Gloria was bought in Kentucky when young and undeveloped by the late Judge of horses, Joshua Wilkins of East Brantree, Mass. She was first raced in Maine in 1894, when she won a 2:30-1/2 at Biddeford that season. The next year, 1895, she lowered the record to 2:19-1/2 in the second heat of a race at Cornish, Me., August 24. She has been raced regularly every year since then and has started out an average in at least a dozen races each season, yet she seems to be better and faster this year than ever before.

"Gloria made a record of 2:10-1/4 in the fifth heat of a race at Franklin Park, Bangor, about the middle of October, 1904, and at the close of last season had won 84 heats in standard time and now has to her credit upwards of 100 heats in 2:35 or better.

"Gloria was bred by W. S. Estes, Clintonville, Ky., and was got by Ethan Wilkes, a horse of the same name, who was owned by George Wilkes (2:23). His dam was (2:14-4) by Alexander's Abdullah, the dam of Gloria (2:10-1/4) was by Alexander's Norman, sire of Lulu (2:18) and May Queen (2:03). It is a great credit to the ability of a man as a trainer and caretaker to campaign an animal as long and successfully as Mr. Fox has campaigned Gloria and kept it in as good condition as the daughter of Ethan Wilkes is this season. An animal must be bred right, however, in order to be capable of racing so long."
