BIG STEAMER'S NARROW ESCAPE

Touched Boltom in Louisburg Harbor in Storm

Blizzard Swept Coast and Several Vessels Had Hard Time—Damage Done on Shore.

LOUISBURG, N. S., March 8.—Str. Bruce, from St. Johns, Nfid., with 29 pasengers and mails, arrived today. Capt. Delaney reports the worst storm in his experience during the voyage. The str. At 11 o'clock Thursday morning the force of the wind broke the Elder-Dempster's str. Sokoto's fastenings at the Dominion Coal Company's pier and the ship went adrift. The anchors held the ship near the mouth of the harbor, where she rode out the gale.

At 4 this morning the wind shifted and the ship's bottom grounded aft on White Rock shoal, where she remained till taken off by the towboats D. K. Thomas and C. M. Winch. The ship is damaged very little, but had there been the least undertow or sea the probabilities are the ship would have been stranded on the bar at the entrance of the harbor.

The steamer was floated by the tugs this evening. The train and telephone service are demoralized, there being absolutely no communication with outside places.
