GLOSING EXERCISES OF THE NORMAL SCHOOL

Medals and Prizes Presented—The Year Has Been Most Successful!

FREDERICTON, June 5—Closing exercises at the Normal School attracted a large number of visitors this morning. The year has been a most successful one. Principal Bridges welcomed all. He spoke in praise of the founders of the institution. He pointed out that the success fully justified the undertaking. The total enrollment for the year numbered 350. In closing Mr. Bridges made a strong plea for increased accommodation.

Misses Raymond, Gibson, McGee, Jones and Watken gave illustrated lessons, a literary programme followed and consisted of readings by Mr. Weldon, Miss McGee and Miss Tait.

The governor general's silver medal for best showing in senior class was presented to Marshall Nasson, Fredericton Junction; Miss Edith Peacock, Westmorland, being a close second.

The governor general's bronze medal was awarded to Miss Gladys McDermott, Charlotte, with Miss Blaney, of the same county, second. Dr. Inch presented the medals.

Chancellor Jones presented Governor Tweedie's prizes, \$30, to Mr. M. Daly, Albert County, of the senior class, and Miss Curran, Restigouche, the sum of \$20, of the junior class.

The exercises closed with a few remarks from Principal Bridges.

MR. & MRS. WM. SHAW HAD NARROW ESCAPE

While Driving, Their Horse Backed Over a Bridge

Both Were Painfully Hurt But Miraculously Escaped Serious Injury.

Wm. Shaw and Mrs. Shaw had a narrow escape from death last evening on the Loch Lomond road.

Mr. and Mrs. Shaw had been enjoying a drive to Loch Lomond and about eight o'clock were returning to the city when the accident occurred. Percy W. Thomson with his large touring car was going out towards the bridge and when a few hundred yards from Charles Mayall's Hotel, Mr. Thomson saw Mr. Shaw driving towards him. Mr. Thomson stopped his car on the side of the road, but even this did not apparently quiet Mr. Shaw's horse for the animal stopped in the middle of a small bridge, and before anything could be done, backed the buggy and occupants over the side. All went crashing down fifteen feet into the ditch.

As quickly as possible Mr. and Mrs. Shaw were extricated from the wreckage and although quite seriously injured were able to get on board the car. They were quickly conveyed to their home on Waterloo street where a physician attended them. Mr. Shaw had his hand and head injured but not very badly. Mrs. Shaw did not fare as well, for besides having her face severely injured her body was badly bruised and she suffered considerably from shock. Despite her injuries she is reported today as being quite recovered and her hurts will have no serious results. Those who witnessed the accident say that it is a miracle that Mr. and Mrs. Shaw were not killed for when the horse backed the carriage over the bridge, it fell over after it but fortunately fell to one side. Had the animal gone backwards, undoubtedly it would have been crushed. The carriage was completely wrecked.

The bridge had no railing to prevent teams from going over the side and is thus very dangerous.

Mr. Thomson did all he could to avert the accident and is not held in any way to blame.
