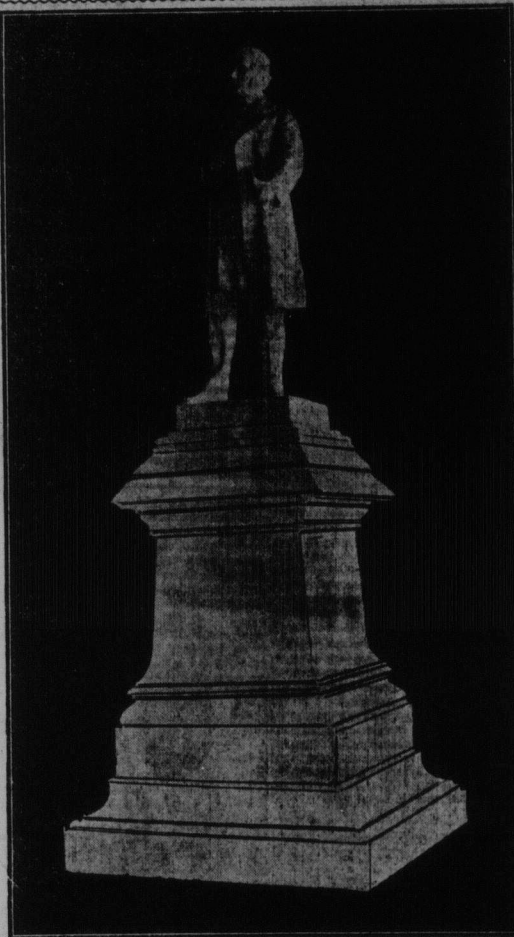
Model On Exhibition.

## ADVANTAGES OF THE SUNDAY TRAIN SERVICE

The C. P. R.'s Sunday train service from Montreal gives rise to a distinct advantage for local people who receive goods by express. Just half a day is saved in the delivery of stuff shipped to St. John from points west of Montreal up to Saturday night, and of shipments which reach Toronto on Friday night. Goods which come under these heads get to the consignees early Monday morning before the business day has opened, whereas their delivery was not commenced formerly until Monday afternoon.

Last Sunday's express stuff was equal in amount to a week-day shipment; all the goods arriving in Montreal before the starting of the train being sent along. At this time of year, when a good deal of the stuff is perishable, the saving in time is a big gain. It means practically a whole day to business men.

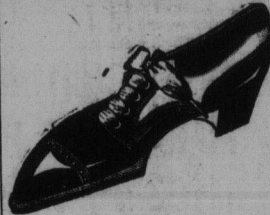
