S., May 31.—The total output of the Domnion Coal Company for the month of May will approximate 296,000 tons, a large increase over the month of April, the output for May being about 4,000 tons short of the average monthly output obtained by the company previous to the strike, when it usually averaged about 300-000. Conditions are improving rapid-ly at all collieries and the desire of the men appears to-remain at work as steadily as possible and make up for lost time during the strike.
