## UMPIRE PRAISES CONNOLLY

Some ten or twelve years ago the local ring followers pointed with pride at the excellent fighting qualities of Eddie Connolly the North End boy who was one of the best ever turned out of this province, and who, after he left his native city climbed so fast that he was soon fighting with the top notchers in his class. But like the rest of the fighters Connolly could not last forever and when he struck the down grade in the fighting line he went fast.

Although Eddie is a has been as a glove artist, his many game battles will be remembered as he was a two-handed clever boxer and as game as they make them.

Connolly has a great admirer in a namesake, Umpire Tommy Connolly, as the following article in the Boston American shows:

Umpire Tommy Connolly is quite a connoisseur on boxing, and he enjoys a good bout almost as well as he does a red-hot battle on the diamond. Speaking about pugilists, Connolly said: "Of all the gladiators that have ever been seen in action I believe I liked Eddie Connolly about as well as any of them. He was the fastest and most graceful boy of his time, and I can't recall having seen any who to my notion were more thrilling."

"He was a fighter of most deceptive appearance for he showed no more muscular development than the average school girl. But that boy could hit a terrific smash with either hand. He had an uppercut that started from the floor, and was his who received one of those jolts on the point of the jaw. Eddie would have been light-weight champion had he mastered the art of change of pace, for he fought too rapidly and kept up the most killing pace every instant he was in action."

"He gave Kid Lavigne an awful lacing for nine or ten rounds, but the Saginaw lad was a glutton for taking it, and Eddie tired from his own furious efforts and collapsed when Lavigne got to him with some hard body blows in the eleventh round."

## SWEDEN TO SEND TEAM TO PANAMA

New York, May 29.—Kristian Hellstrom, secretary of the Swedish Olympic committee, has written a letter to a friend in this city that Sweden will be represented by a team of athletes at the Panama-Pacific Exposition in 1915.

The Swedes will travel to San Francisco via New York and make stops at the principal points between the Atlantic and the Pacific. Hellstrom suggests that there might be a sort of international meet in New York before the Swedes start West. The plan now is to bring about a dozen of the best men, that is, the ones only with a chance to make a showing.

Foremost among those mentioned is Eric Lemming, holder of the world's record for throwing the javelin; Wide, holder of the Swedish record for the mile run, and Lindberg, the record sprinter, are also spoken of as likely to come.

Paris, May 29.—Richard E. Kiegin, who owns the European rights for motor polo, is in Paris on his way to London. He says he has reached the big Shepherd Bush stadium for the remainder of the current year and has also arranged to give three motor polo games at Ranelagh on May 31, June 4 and June 7.

King George hopes to attend the opening game. During the month of June Mr. Kiegin will give Paris its first chance of seeing baseball played by professionals of the International baseball organization. He has hired Pare Eaux Princes, near Autell, for this purpose. For May or April, 1914, the same energetic manager has placed greater things. He has completed arrangements with the Italian government for a revival of the ancient Roman sports on a gigantic scale on the site just outside the great baths of Caracalla. Chariot races by thirty-two rival teams, driving chariots of which some have done duty in "Ben Hur," will be a sensational feature of the festival. Seats will be provided for 200,000.

### MONTREAL RELIGIOUS STATISTICS.

Montreal, May 30.—While 70,000 Montrealers do not go to church, there are only a dozen infidels in the city, and very few members of other than the orthodox denominations, according to figures made public today by the Montreal Home Visitation Committee, which yesterday, in a whirlwind religious census, visited eighty-two per cent of the city's homes, representing 400,000 people. A remarkably small diversity of religious faith was shown. Catholics are greatly in the lead, although definite comparative figures were totals refused. The largest number of children found in any one city family was eighteen, in a Hebrew home. The census takers report that aristocratic Westmount has by far the smallest number of children to the number of homes in any district in Greater Montreal.

## TIGERS SAVE \$490 IF COBB IS INJURED

Detroit, Mich., May 30.—If Ty Cobb slides into second base too hard and twists his ankle so that he is unable to practice his profession, Frank J. Navin, president of the Tigers, will be forced to pay Cobb as much as \$10 a week while he is out. This heavy obligation was undertaken by the Tigers' president when he put his club under the provisions of the state employers' liability law.

This measure states that a disabled employee must be paid "an amount equal to one-half his weekly wage, not to exceed \$10 a week."

Ty gets somewhere around \$500 a week. Half this is \$250, but according to law, the club would not have to pay him this amount. Mr. Cobb would have to let the Cobb family pike along on \$10, unless he had saved something from his previous week's pay.

According to baseball law, Ty would be paid full salary while on the bench. If the Georgian is injured, the club can save somewhere around \$400 a week by compensating him under the Michigan law. 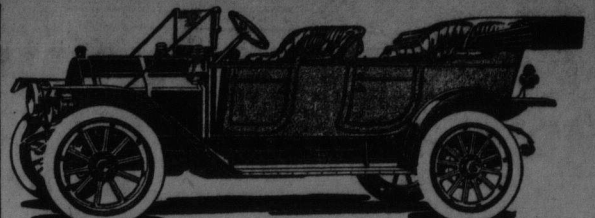
