

MEET TO TOAST SIR FREDERIC BARKER

"King," which was honored in the usual manner. At the close of the singing of "God Save the King," Mr. Teed proposed the toast of the evening, "Our Guest," which was greeted with continued applause and cheers.

The Bench Honored.

The toast "The Bench" was proposed by the Attorney General, H. Grimmer, who on rising was tendered an ovation. Hon. Mr. Grimmer stated he could recall thirty years ago when the services of the present Chief Justice were appreciated by those at the bar and that then he had had impressed on him the vast magnitude and strong nature of Sir Frederic E. Barker. Those who have gone to the bar of New Brunswick have always received the benefit of his knowledge of law.

Extends Congratulations.

Mr. Justice McLeod was greeted with applause and the hearty slogan of "For he is a jolly good fellow." In opening he spoke of the fact if Hon. Justice Landry had been present it would have been his duty as the oldest member of the bench to have responded to the toast. Continuing, Mr. Justice McLeod stated that he joined with all in extending the heartiest congratulations to Sir Frederic Barker. The Chief Justice, said the speaker, had always maintained the best relations between the bench and the bar and had enjoyed the deep respect of all.

The Profession.

T. Carleton Allen, K. C., in proposing the toast "The Bar," was notified in no uncertain terms that "he was a jolly good fellow," a sentiment strongly backed up by three rousing cheers. In opening, Mr. Allen stated that he felt deeply honored to be called on to propose a toast to "The Bar," and went on to say a tribute to the worthy deeds of the guest of the evening. The bar of today, said Mr. Allen, is not what it was thirty years ago. The bar of today is learning and integrity in advance of the bar at any time in the history of the province. (Applause.)

Hon. J. D. Hazen Greeted.

Hon. J. D. Hazen when proposing the toast "The Honorable Members of the Bar," stated that it was a matter of great pleasure and delight for him to be present for the purpose of doing so to the guest of the evening (applause) and heartily joined with his brethren of the profession in an expression of pleasure of the toast. He then spoke in making the Chief Justice a knight.

A Helpful Address.

J. B. Baxter, K. C., in response, stated that it fell to him through temporary tenure of office to say something for the greatest body in New Brunswick, first in its relation to the bench, and secondly in its relation to the public at large. In the relation of the bar to the bench, Mr. Baxter said, although he was but a comparatively young member of the bar he had felt the influence and great knowledge of Sir Frederic Barker. "The bar feels," said Mr. Baxter, "that when a man is made a judge he is consecrated to the duties of his position, and from that moment a courteous line is set up and is one of the glorious customs of the British bar. This attitude was supported by the continued presence of such men as the guest of the evening."

Continuing Hon. Mr. Hazen spoke in the highest terms of Sir Frederic, and stated that the bar of the North American continent so deserving of the honor as Sir Frederic, who he was glad to number among the warmest friends.

The History of St. Joseph's.

The first speaker of the occasion was Rev. P. Belliveau, who in an eloquent address in French, expressed on behalf of those in whose behalf he spoke the appreciation of the work which the faculty of St. Joseph's has done for the cause of Christian education. He reviewed the history of the institution he paid tribute to the founders of the college, Rev. Camille Lefebvre and Father Lafrance, who, as pioneers, built the foundation of what has grown to be one of the principal educational centres of the Maritime Provinces, and which they began to be continued by their successors, and today St. Joseph's faces the problem of providing for a greater number of students. The need is significant of the times, and gives evidence of the increased interest with the people in taking in higher education.

To Meet This Need and to continue on a larger and more perfect scale.

The college of the hill one of the most well marked in the province, the number of students has increased from a few dozen to over three hundred. The institution in the educational system has been proportionately great, and every effort has been made to bring up to date the complete degree of efficiency obtaining in other universities of the province.

He then referred to the plans in view for rearranging the system and the scheme under way to fittingly observe the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of St. Joseph's, and impressed upon the students, past and present, the need of greater loyalty to the alma mater and exhorted them to co-

operate in giving St. Joseph's best properties to the educational institutions of the province.
