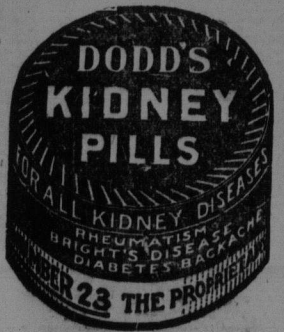

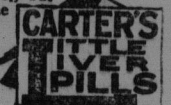

Asks Destruction Of Webber's Liquor

Magistrate Will Take Time to Consider Application — Third Charge Against Webber Dismissed — Police Court Cases.

Acting on information supplied by Sally Sahody who was arrested for drunkenness Monday night, Frank Davidson was charged in the police court yesterday morning with having supplied Sahody with liquor. Evidence was given by Inspectors McAlister, Merryfield and Kerr who made the arrests. Sahody said he could remember nothing of what happened. The case was postponed until Friday morning.

In order that witnesses might be procured for the defense the case of Elmer Thomas, charged with the neglect of his children, was postponed till this afternoon. K. A. Wilson is conducting the prosecution. The case of Harry Barry charged with keeping women in his house for immoral purposes, and that of Elizabeth Greer, charged with vagrancy, were postponed. The judge congratulated Sergeant Charles Rankine who effected the arrests following the condition of affairs disclosed by the finding the Thomas children in Barry's house.

The Webber case which aroused so much interest throughout the city following the spectacular raid of the defendant's house by the prohibition inspectors last November, and the three charges which were subsequently brought against Webber was concluded in the police court yesterday when the third charge was dismissed the defendant having been previously adjudged guilty of the first two offences.

W. M. Ryan in concluding the case for the prosecution, stated that according to the Act the owner, residing on the premises, must prove beyond a reasonable doubt that he did not have liquor in his possession for sale. This he contended the defendant had not done and he would therefore ask for a conviction.

In summing up the case, Judge Ritchie said that the defendant had been found in possession of liquor and that he did not have the liquor for sale, and there did not enter into his mind the slightest particle of doubt as to the defendant's innocence. He therefore ordered that the case be dismissed.

Application was then made by the prosecution that an order be given by the court for the destruction of the liquor seized. The judge reserved his decision till Monday morning at eleven when he will deliver judgment in the matter.

Prominent Shipping Man Buried Here

Funeral of David Stewart, Deputy Port Warden of Montreal, Took Place in West St. John Yesterday — Large Concourse of Shipping Men.

The remains of David Robertson Stewart, a son of Commodore Stewart, of the old Beaver Line, were brought to St. John yesterday on the Montreal train, and buried in the Carleton cemetery. Mr. Stewart, whose father commanded one of the first ships of the Beaver Line to come to St. John, and was later captain of the Empress of Britain, has been Deputy Port Warden at Montreal since the death of the late Captain Reid, and had a host of friends among the shipping fraternity. He married Miss Cogle, a daughter of John Cogle, of West St. John.

The funeral took place from the Fairville station, and was attended by a large concourse of shipping men, including representatives of the C. P. O. S., the Furness Withy Company, the Head Line, the Canadian Steamship Lines, Ltd., the Canadian Government Merchant Marine Ltd., and a large number of the officers of the ships in port, many of them in uniform. In the funeral procession there were also representatives of St. John and Amherst Packing Companies, and a number of the mercantile houses of the city, besides friends in all walks of life.

Rev. Dr. Morrison read the funeral service at the grave, and Ritchie Bell, the well-known manager of the Seamen's Mission at Montreal, who came here with the remains, offered prayer. Before going to Montreal Mr. Stewart lived in St. John for about seven years, holding a position with the C. P. R. He leaves a widow and two children.
