

TRACTION STOCKS WEAKER FRIDAY

Noticeably Firming Among
Issues on the Bond List,
Especially Among War
Loans.

Montreal, June 18.—Brompton again led the list in activities on the local stock exchange, although, considering the general favorable reception accorded the company's re-organization plans, the stock acted disappointingly. It closed at 136 from an opening at 133 1/2 and a firming to 139. The net gain was two points of half a point at 147 1/2. Price Brothers continued strong, moving up a further point to a new high of 365. The other papers were steady.

The Traction stocks were weaker, with Detroit down three points to 105; Quebec Railway lost 3 1/2 points at 25 5/8 and Canadian held steady at 43. Toronto Railway edged 3 to 39 and Winnipeg sold at 39 as compared with 34 in March last year.

The Mercantile stocks were fractionally lower, in the case of Steamships preferred to 2 1/4 points, up in case of Dominion Steel, which sold up to 66. Stronger features in the balance of the list were B. C. Fishing, recently a weaker stock of the market, which sold up 7 points to 47. Canada Car recovered four points of its six point loss of yesterday. Asbestos common dropped 2 3/4 points to 82 1/4.

In the bond list there was noticeable firming among the war loans, but in the industrial Cedars Rapids five's lost 2 3/4 per cent. to 83 3/4. Total trading: Listing, 15,911; bonds, \$5,100; vouchers, ten.

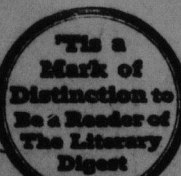
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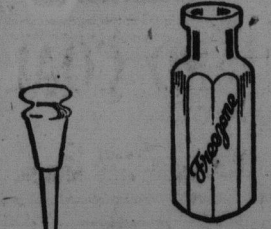
