Athletes Secured In Olympic Trials

Twenty-Five of Canada's Best Will Sail from Montreal Tomorrow on Their Way to Belgium to Compete for World's Championships.

Toronto, July 22.—(By the Canadian Press)—Twenty-five of Canada's best athletes secured in the Olympic trials at various parts of Canada, will sail from Montreal on the steamer Melita on Saturday next, on their way to Belgium to compete for the world's championships in their various fields of sport and athletics. This will be the third section of Canada's Olympic contestants to leave for the cyclists, for the big Olympiad the first section was composed of the Falcon hockey team of Winnipeg which returned home "with the bacon."

The second was composed of trap shooters. The section to sail on Saturday is known as the main body of Canadian Olympic candidates and will be in charge of James G. Merrick, Toronto, as manager, Chairman of the Canadian Olympic Committee and Norton H. Crows, Toronto, Secretary of the Committee. Walter R. Knox of Orillia will go along as coach, and C. A. Beeber of Toronto, as trainer for the cyclists.

Everything Ready For Today's Race

Shamrock's Underbody Found All Right—Working on Resolute—Americans Have Challenge Ready Should Shamrock Win Cup.

Sandy Hook, N. J., July 22.—Shamrock IV, slipped out of drydock tonight and is ready to race again tomorrow for the America's Cup.

Meanwhile the crew of Resolute, American defender, got in the day making things ship-shape aboard their craft and also are preparing to give battle.

With the tally now standing 2 to 1 in favor of the challenger, Resolute must win the next two contests if the hundred guinea Cup is not to travel back overseas in custody of the Royal Ulster Yacht Club.

Shamrock in Dry Dock

The Shamrock arrived at a Staten Island shipyard early today under tow and at once was put on the ways in order that her underbody might be scraped. It was the belief of her crew that she had collected oil on her sleek sides since she had left drydock about a week ago, but when she was slid back into the water late this afternoon, this fear was pronounced groundless. Not a barnacle and scarcely a streak of oil had been found on her hull.

Work On Resolute

While Captain Charles Francis Adams II, did not order Resolute put in dry dock for another inspection he gave his crew little rest as the great white sloop lay anchored in the shelter of the Hook. Sails were gone over, compasses tested and the last touch given the racer before resumption of the 1920 regatta.

The Race Today

Tomorrow's race will be held on the fourth, as the second had to be rescheduled because a dropping wind which failed to drive the yachts across the finish line within the six hour time limit—will be over a three-dayed course, starting and ending usual from the Ambrose Channel Lightship. The equilateral triangle of 10 miles to a leg will be plotted just before the start, when the race committee ob serves direction of the wind.

A Challenge Ready

It was reported here tonight that in the event that Shamrock won the America's Cup either tomorrow or Saturday the New York Yacht Club would place a challenge in the hands of the representative of the Royal Ulster Yacht Club for a race next year and that the United States Club would challenge with a 115 foot schooner, W. L. Gardner, the designer, is said to have been commissioned to draw plans for the schooner if the America's Cup is lost to Sir Thomas Lipton.

Working Aloft

Before Shamrock left tonight for Sandy Hook under tow, seamen aboard her were observed working on the top sparring. Although shipyard officials professed ignorance of what work was being done aloft, the belief held here tonight that the old top mast had been re-stepped, in order to do away with the challenger's big topmast which forces her to give Resolute a time allowance of seven minutes and one second, instead of six minutes and 40 seconds.

Sustained Slight Injury

It was admitted at the Staten Island shipyard that Shamrock has sustained a slight injury during yesterday's race. According to yacht officials two rivets were broken as a result of the strain on the boom and it was found necessary today to place a brace under the after deck.

It was denied at the yard, however, that the challenger had slightly sprung her deck during the rush to windward yesterday.

The Industrial League Game

Grand Circuit Races Yesterday

Monster Crowd Witnessed a Slaughter of Five Favorites in Three of the Four Events at Kalamazoo, Mich.

Kalamazoo, Mich., July 22.—A monster crowd turned out for "Kalamazoo Day" at the Grand Circuit races, and the onlookers witnessed a slaughter of five favorites in three of the four events. In the 2:05 pace, Louis Gratian, after winning the first heat, was decisively beaten by Johnnie Quirk in the second heat and by Goldie Todd in the third and fourth heats.

Royal Palm, son of Peter the Great, and driven by Charlie Valentine, won the \$3,900 purse for 2:13 trotters, outstepping Alta Donovan and a field of eight others in straight heats. The average time for the three miles, 2:06, was fast for the class.

Don De Looze, driven by Geers, winner of the 2:06 trot at Toledo, was best liked in today's 2:05 trot, but failed to win a heat. Baron Cegante took the first, and then Murphy came along with Charlie Rex and captured the second and third heats. The time in the second mile, 2:04 1/4, is a season's record for trotters.

In the three-year-old trot, Great Britton, the Dodge entry, made good by taking the first and third heats. The Great Miss Morris won the second heat, but broke badly in the third and was distanced.
