BEULAH CAMP.

SECOND BUSINESS SESSION OF REFORMED BAPTIST ALLIANCE.

Choice of Evangelists for 1903 Left to Committee—Officers and Committees Appointed—Committee Reports Difficulties in Getting Suitable Camp Meeting Workers.

Beulah Camp Ground, Brown's Wharf, June 27—Attendance was good at the second business session of the Reformed Baptist Alliance this morning. The business transacted was somewhat of a routine nature. Discussion on choice of an evangelist for the camp meeting of 1903 occupied a portion of the time...

Rev. S. A. Baker, on behalf of the committee on camp meeting workers, reported, showing the difficulties in the way of securing suitable workers.

Rev. S. Greenlaw strongly favored the paying of money to preachers within the denomination rather than to outside workers.

B. N. Goodspeed reported on behalf of the evangelistic committee that an evangelist had been engaged by the alliance last year and that \$128.50 was still due him.

PRESBYTERY IN SESSION.

BUSY MEETING IN ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH YESTERDAY.

Rev. S. B. Hillock, Formerly of Church of England, Added to the Roll—The Call to Rev. A. D. Fraser—Standing Committees Named.

The Presbytery of St. John opened at 10 o'clock yesterday morning in St. Andrew's church, with rather a good attendance at the start. Rev. Dr. Morrison, the moderator, opened the meeting with scriptural reading and prayer; Clerk A. H. Foster read the minutes of the last session, which were received and approved.

The moderator read the docket of business. Rev. L. G. Macneil, of St. Andrew's church, raised the question as to the status of the committee on the roll.

The following names of elders were received: St. Stephen's church, J. H. Parks; St. Andrew's church, Forster, Chapman, Isaac, W. Baird; St. Matthew's, W. M. Draper; St. John's, D. McLean; Fairville, John Willet; Waterford, J. A. Moore; Moncton, P. Hopper.

A communication from the general assembly was read and resulted in the name of Rev. S. B. Hillock, who formerly held the call from the Church of England, being added to the roll of the presbytery.

The committee which had been appointed to report on the resignation of Rev. A. D. Fraser, reported that they recommended that assessors should not be continued to sit in a session where there is already a quorum.

Communication was read from the congregational session of St. Matthew's church, and the assessors from further duty. On motion the presbytery tendered their thanks to the retiring assessors.

It was moved and seconded that John Willet be retired as an assessor of Fairville church, and a vote of thanks be tendered to the retiring assessors.

The moderator then announced that a call from Beakville and Indianport Presbytery of Miramichi had been extended to Rev. A. D. Fraser. The clerk read the report of the committee on the 29th inst.

A motion was then read in which Mr. Purvis and Mr. Willet, of Fairville church, were released from their appointment to prepare a resolution of appreciation of the services of Rev. A. D. Fraser.

The moderator reported to the business of the general assembly. The business of the day was then attended to.

Rev. Dr. Potheringham reported that the delegates from St. John had been fully prepared for their work, but the assembly had been peaceful all through. Rev. Mr. Ireland also reported favorably from the session.

Rev. Mr. Hillock, the newly appointed minister, also spoke as to his first impressions of a Presbytery assembly.

Communications were read by the clerk of a summer school at Halifax for the instruction of Sunday school teachers. It was decided to take no movement in the matter until the expenses of the school were ascertained.

A communication was read from the secretary of the Women's Home Mission Society, desiring to discontinue the existence of that society and requesting the presbytery to receive the books and papers of the society.

It was resolved that the clerk be authorized to receive these books.

Rev. A. D. Fraser gave notice of motion at the next meeting that the clerk be authorized to receive these books.

Mr. Morton was appointed to preside and address the people of the congregation and Mr. Mann to address the minister.

The clerk read a bill for postage and printing, amounting to \$6, which was recommended to be paid.
