MCKENZIE MURDER

Bernard Haggerty, of Loch Lomond, Dead in His Lonely Home

Nephew of Slavin, ONE OF THE SLAYERS

Acted as Unwilling Guide When Arrest of the Two Slavs and Breen Was Made—A Fearful Tragedy, in Which Nine Lives Were Sacrificed.

The sudden death of Bernard Haggerty at the second Loch Lomond, one day last week, removed the last of the prominent figures in the McKenzie murder case.

It was by means of the pair of trousers that the murderers were traced. McKenzie had been a tailor and was well known among the oldest who it is believed fell into a small room, and was murdered there.

Haggerty an Unwilling Guide. The whereabouts of the men had been definitely located by the statements of Haggerty, and Capt. Scoullar, with Police Constable Breen, and the men were taken to the house of the late Haggerty.
