UNITED STATES IS LOSING THE BEST FARMERS OF CANADA

United States Nothing But An "Agricultural School" for the Dominion, Declares Washington Correspondent.

(Washington Correspondence of Boston Transcript.)

Washington, May 19—While the Congress of the United States is wasting its time with needless investigations and oratory and dawdling over the legislative technique of conservation, Canada is draining the West of thousands of this country's best agriculturists. It may be, and probably is, a coincidence that the greatest activity in the Canadian immigration of a time when the United States government has tied up countless acres of farm land for fear that unscrupulous capitalists will seize upon the privileges which belong to the people, nevertheless the fact remains that Canada is making the most unprecedented exertions to attract American settlers to her great Northwest. No less than 100,000 American men have gone to Canada in the last eight years ending March 31, 1910. About 50,000 more in 1909, the number gradually increased to about 60,000 in 1908 and in 1910, when the immigration of the United States was at its lowest ebb, the number leaped to 103,000. Of a total Canadian immigration of 1,424,868 in the last eight years, more than thirty per cent have gone to the United States. Only thirty per cent of this new population of nearly a million and a half came from England, eight per cent from Scotland, and two per cent from Ireland. Italian, Hebrew, Scandinavian and Russians furnished a total of only eleven per cent; and of all this large number the preponderating majority were classified strictly by race, seventy-three per cent of the immigrant arrivals in Canada in the last eight years belong to the Teutonic and Celtic races of northern western Europe. The remainder of the population of the United States of the Slavic and Iberic races of southern and eastern Europe and southwestern Asia. During the same period only twenty-three per cent of such arrivals in the United States were of Teutonic and Celtic extraction from northern and western Europe, while seventy-seven per cent were of the Slavic and Iberic races of southern and eastern Europe and southwestern Asia.

These figures are appalling from several points of view. "I don't dare to look at them," said Secretary Nagel of the Department of Commerce and Labor, while discussing the situation with a visitor the other day. "They mean that the flower of agricultural Europe and America is pouring into Canada to develop her illimitable resources, but that the scouring of southern Europe are coming through the United States. These figures are made the more impressive when it is realized that the male immigrants from the United States to Canada each take an estimated average of \$100 in their pockets, while the European emigrants to the United States bring only about \$20 each into the country.

The activity of the Dominion government in offering bounties to American farmers to cross the line is a story in itself. The government assigns agents to various localities in the United States to solicit and advertise the advantages of Canadian agricultural lands. In 1908 agents were maintained at the following named points in this country: Marquette (Mich.), Detroit (Mich.), Toledo, Ohio; Indianapolis (Ind.); Chicago (Ill.); Milwaukee (Wis.); Kansas City (Mo.); Omaha (Neb.); St. Paul (Minn.); Watertown (S. D.); Grand Forks (N. D.); Great Falls (Mont.); Spokane (Wash.); Pittsburg (Pa.); Syracuse (N. Y.); Boston (Mass.).

CANADA ADVERTISES LIBERALLY.

Agents at these places make use of every means of publicity compatible with the dignity that should surround a work carried out under government auspices, including the circulation of printed literature, advertisement in the weekly papers of agricultural communities, exhibits at State and county fairs, meetings, lectures, free excursions through Canada, etc. In 1906 advertisements were inserted in nearly 7,000 country weekly and farm journals, and this soliciting matter has been carried on to a much greater extent in the years following.

Reduced rates on railroads are obtained for prospective settlers, and when they leave their homes Canadian agents often accompany them in order to guard against the possibility of their changing their minds before reaching the Canadian border. Thousands of these American emigrants were originally emigrants to the United States. They came here, settled in the West and developed the farming lands, until these lands could be sold at a remunerous profit. With the money they earned they and their children are going to the Canadian Northwest, where the prospect is bright. In the United States it would appear that the United States will be made simply an agricultural school for Canada if the movement herein outlined continues.

"NOTHING IN IT"

That is What Surveyor-General Grimmer Says About New Brunswick Prohibition of Pulp Wood.

The following article which many New Brunswickers will read with surprise, is reproduced from "The Paper Mill and Wood Pulp News" of New York (Correspondence of The Paper Mill), Ottawa, May 4, 1910:—"Absolutely nothing in it!"

This was the pronouncement of Hon. W. C. H. Grimmer, surveyor-general of New Brunswick, today, concerning a dispatch from Washington to the effect that in all probability New Brunswick would follow in the wake of Quebec in prohibiting the export to the United States of wood pulp from the crown lands within its boundaries.

"No, there's absolutely nothing in it," repeated Mr. Grimmer. "The Legislature of New Brunswick passed a resolution stating that the prohibition of wood pulp from the crown lands of the province would be designed to benefit the people of a committee, of which I was a member ex-officio, was appointed to look into the expediency of enacting legislation to this effect. We haven't collected a great deal of information, but, judging from the little we have already collected, you may say most emphatically that there's nothing, absolutely nothing, in that Washington dispatch."

From the general tenor of Mr. Grimmer's remarks, it was assumed that there is little probability that the export of wood pulp to the United States will be prohibited by New Brunswick. MCL.

The impression in New Brunswick has been that the local government would restrict the export of crown land wood. Indeed after the tariff settlement with Washington some weeks ago it was expected that the New Brunswick government would act without delay. If Mr. Grimmer is correctly quoted the government has no intention of following Quebec's example.
