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The following Letter from Dr. George Henry Davis, Secretary to the Parent Institution in London, as affording much important information respecting its proceedings, is here inserted:—

*London, November 18, 1859.*

RESPECTED AND DEAR BRETHREN,

There are some points as to the Libraries supplied to our North American Branches, to which I am desirous of inviting your attention.

1. A desire was expressed to me, in various parts, that we should prepare lists of books to constitute Libraries of various prices. We were accustomed to do so in England, but it has been found much more desirable to permit Ministers and Sunday School Superintendents to make their own selection, for which purpose Catalogues have been supplied to them. Should you prefer this plan, we shall willingly supply you with a sufficient number of Catalogues to carry it out.

2. These Libraries are furnished at *half subscriber's* prices, that is, considerably below the cost. It has, therefore, been the rule of the Committee, that they should not be supplied until the amount was remitted.

This rule is strictly observed in England, but it has been completely overlooked in some of our Canadian Societies. Permit me to call your attention to it, and to observe that, if
