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I might point out to the hon. gentleman that one of the reasons our aid sometimes lags behind appropriations is that it does not lapse at the end of the year, whereas some other contributing countries insist that the money be used during the year. Since we have been concentrating on development we had allowed the amounts to accumulate, and sometimes they are not expended as rapidly as would otherwise be the case. With regard to aid in the form of wheat, if there are people who need our wheat I can assure the hon. member that we will be only too happy to increase our appropriation in this respect.

Mr. Lewis: A supplementary question, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. I would suggest that we move on to another subject. There is only a short time left in the question period and several hon. members wish to ask questions. If there is time at the end of the question period we might return to this very important matter.

QUEBEC-HAIL AND RAIN DAMAGE SUFFERED BY MARKET GARDENERS AND APPLE GROWERS

Mr. Walter Smith (Saint-Jean): With your permission, Mr. Speaker, I would like to address a question to the Minister of Agriculture through his parliamentary secretary.

Would the Minister of Agriculture have received a telegram from the Association of truck gardeners of the Montreal area in connection with damages incurred through hail and rain in the Sherrington, Saint-Michel and Ville-Laval areas? Would he also have received one from the Hemmingford and Covey Hill apple growers?

In general, the problem of crops damaged by bad weather is entirely one for the provinces and, in the past, when the provincial authorities could not cope financially with the damages caused by bad weather, they would ask the federal government for help.

But in the last few years, the federal government has established crop insurance and has granted close to \$1,200,000 to the province of Quebec.
