**20 Years Ago**  
Port Credit's election will cost the village about \$4 per a vote, village clerk-treasurer Lou Magness says. Only 210 — 5.9 per cent — of the 3,282 eligible voters in Port Credit, and 242 eligible in S.S.-19 Toronto Township, cast ballots in the municipality's quietest election. Most civic officials felt public lethargy stemmed from failure to nominate sufficient candidates to create an interesting election.

Harold A. Clarke has been named first president of the newly-formed South Peel Real Estate Board. The board has approved a comprehensive panel of rules and regulations and a code of ethics to ensure close cooperation and fair dealing

between realtors and owners.

The planned South Peel Hospital, which will be located at Centre Rd. and Upper Middle Rd., will have a 102-bed capacity. It was originally planned as 85-bed institution. Cost of increasing the hospital size is about \$72,000.

**10 Years Ago**  
A plan to construct a bridge over the Credit River, connecting Mineola Rd. in the east with Indian Rd. in the west, has been approved in principle by township council. Council urged that an appraisal be obtained immediately on a parcel of land on the west side of the river which would be required if the bridge plan is to be carried out in the future.
