

- Jan. 3. Hon. W.F.A. Turgeon presented his credentials as Canadian Minister to Luxembourg.
- Jan. 3. E.K. Davis, president of Aluminum Ltd., Montreal, denied statement made by a U.S. official that a Canadian subsidiary of the Aluminum Company of America had aided Germany's re-armament programme.
- Jan. 3. Governor Dewey, in addressing the opening session of the state legislature, declared that New York should develop the power and seaway resources of the St. Lawrence in co-operation with the Dominion of Canada and the province of Ontario, if the "Federal administration is unable or unwilling to proceed."
- Jan. 3. Extension of Canada House into the premises now occupied by the Royal College of Physicians on Pall Mall, is under consideration as a post-war project, it was understood today.
- Jan. 4. Sir Patrick Duff, Deputy United Kingdom High Commissioner to Canada since 1941, has been appointed Britain's High Commissioner to New Zealand.
- Jan. 4. Legislation providing for completion of the St. Lawrence river waterway was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives by Rep. William Pittinger.
- Jan. 4. Premier Drew of Ontario told the Empire Club of Toronto that Canadians "want and are entitled to personal security, but the history of the tragic years since 1919 tells us only too clearly that there can be no personal security without national security, and that national security demands positive action to prevent war."
- Jan. 4. Hon. R.S. Hudson, Minister of Agriculture for Great Britain, is having a series of conferences with Canadian agricultural authorities.
