SPECIAL SERVICES

At the Park St. Methodist Church yesterday two excellent addresses were delivered by Miss Miller, the Australian evangelist. In the morning she took as her text,—"Put on the whole armor of God, that ye may be able to withstand against the wiles of the devil,"—Eph. 6, 11. In the strongest terms the speaker pointed out that the three things to be fought against by Christians were, the world, the flesh and the devil. A solo, "He Holds My Hand," was rendered in excellent style by Mr. Garfield Hallman.

One of the largest crowds that has ever been present in the church assembled at night to hear Miss Miller's closing address, and it proved a powerful meeting. The speaker took as her theme, "Success, and how to get it." She said the things necessary to get success were, a confession of Christ, studying the Word, and the unloading of unnecessary baggage. Under the latter head she included the theatre, round dance and the card table with a mild form of gambling. She stated that for eighteen years experience in this work, a large part of which time she had dealt with thousands of cases, 90 per cent. of all cases met with traced their beginning of their downfall to these three things, and particularly to the round dance. The singing of "The Old Time Religion" by the immense congregation which packed the entire edifice was a part of the service.

AUTOCRACY HAS GONE FOREVER.

Comments of London Papers Showing Trend of British Opinion.

London, Jan. 23.—Such phrases as these, extracted from editorial articles in the London morning papers sufficiently indicate the opinion held here of yesterday's events in St. Petersburg.

"Revolt has been quelled, but revolution begun."

"The bureaucracy has declared its policy; it is the policy of Blagovestnik—massacre."

"The inevitable reaction has begun, and with it a new chapter in Russia's history, and probably also in the history of Europe and Asia."

"The revolutionary movement in Russia has received its baptism of blood, its crown of martyrdom."

"Is there a Mirabeau or even a Danton in Russia to-day?"

A very grave responsibility lies to-day at the door of the Czar, who has failed to grasp his unique opportunity."

"The Little Father" has become the murderer of his people; and it remains with him to save the country from disaster. Even at the eleventh hour he may do so, but only by recognizing that autocracy has gone forever."

While many estimate the casualties at anywhere near 2,000 killed and 5,000 wounded, there is every where conclusive evidence of the impossibility of as yet estimating with any degree of exactitude.

THE LATEST BULLETIN.

30,000 Or 40,000 Armed Strikers Reported Marching On St. Petersburg.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 23.—Firing continues on the Vassil Ostrov at midnight. It is rumored that the workmen there have seized a dynamite factory, and also that 30,000 or 40,000 armed strikers from Kolpino, sixteen miles distant, are marching on St. Petersburg.

Barricades erected on the Island of Vassil Ostrov late last night were destroyed by troops almost immediately, with the loss of thirty workmen killed.

Resembled a Shambles.

At the Putloff works the scenes resembled a shambles. There the workmen, facing the troops when the order was given to fire, threw themselves upon their faces on the ground. The troops fired on them as they lay prostrate.

Yaqus Kill Americans.

Nogales, Ariz., Jan. 23.—Four Americans and one Mexican were ambushed and killed by Yaqus Indians on Thursday afternoon, Jan. 19, four miles east of Nogales, 35 miles east of the Colorado State of Sonora, Mexico. The dead:

Hotels Close Their Doors.

Neepawa, Jan. 23.—Saturday morning all the hotels in the town closed their doors. Neepawa is a temperance town, and the mayor and council instructed the chief of police to search the hostellers with the result that liquor was found in three houses and the proprietors were fined \$75 each. The hotelmen's action is in consequence thereof.

Folk Shake Up St. Louis.

St. Louis, Jan. 23.—A letter was received Saturday by Chief of Police Kiely from Governor Folk in relation to the strict enforcement of the law concerning wine rooms, saloons, dance halls, gambling rooms and kindred resorts, and last night proprietors and habitués of wine rooms and dance halls by the score were placed under arrest.

John Charlton Recovering.

Lynedoch, Jan. 23.—Hon. John Charlton had a severe stroke at his home here on Monday. His condition was considered to be serious, and his brothers, J. W. A. Charlton of Toronto and Thomas Charlton of North Tonawanda, N.Y., were called. At present he is improving slowly, and hopes of his speedy recovery are entertained.

Bail For Accused Scientists.

Toronto, Jan. 23.—Bail was granted on Saturday morning to the four Christian Scientists who are held on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of Wallace Gogor fellow. The sum of \$2,000 was asked for each. The hearing will be resumed on Thursday.

Anarchists At Michel's Funeral.

Paris, Jan. 23.—The funeral of Louise Michel, the revolutionary agitator at Levallois Perret, yesterday was the occasion of a large anarchist demonstration. The streets, however, were heavily guarded by military and police, and there was no serious disorder.
