The bitterest foes to emanipation are not the wealthy slave-owners, but that class known as the mean Whites in the South, who dread the competition of negro labor. Our object, however, is not to embark in any discusion as to the working of the system. We admit with our contemperaries, that slave-holding is to be deprecated; but we differ from them when they utter sharp reproaches against the American nation because they tolerate the evil. It is an easy matter for a man to sit before a comfortable fire, and canvass and criticize the conduct of others; but ask for a remedy, require him to sugmode of curing the disease of which he implains, he is silent, or replies in a strain of buffoonery. Historical references make known the fact that slaves were imported from Africa into America as a profitable traffic, in which Bristol, as well as other English towns, largely participated; that the trade was pursued-not a ion of the Colonists, but in actual dehance of their wishes and requests—to enrich English traders; and thus the thirteen Province were flooded with cargoes of the captured negroes The Revolution but perpetuated the wrong in-flicted upon the colored race; yet we have not een any attempt by the ablest censors of the historians to elucidate the problem by which the negro could be emancipated with social interests. The conduct of England in free ing the blacks of the West India Islands, furnishes no analogy by which we can arrive at a correct onclusion as to the operation of such a measur ments, upon a limited scale, and upon a favorable locality, have ended in the absolute ruin of the West India interest, without elevating the black man to the paths of civilization. English philan thropy might cost some twenty millions; but it may be fairly assumed, that had there been three millions of African slaves in England, as there are now in the United States, she would have hesitated long ere she turned them loose upon society. The mere cost, calculated at the West India value, would have been eighty millions; but a more serious consideration than the mere money part of ection would have checked legislation. Such is, virtually, the condition of affairs in the Republic, and no man has yet pointed, out a reasonable and practical mode of abating the evil. The Americans are not insensible to the exigencies of their position. They have purchased terhave colonized and protected it; yes, were standing all the allurements presented, the colored race are markedly reluctant to turn their faces towards their natural resting-place. They cling, with an unseemly tenacity, to the Northern cities, and strive to extort sympathy, while they neglec their obvious duty. Even in Castada a siekly sentimentality has grown up; we must, foreaoth, make free grants of land to negroes, while we turn a deaf ear to the sick and poor of our own race, and refuse them our waste lands, unless purchase with their toil. The amalgamation of the race is repugnant to the dictates of nature, and revolting to our sense of decency; it is inexpedient and unnatural, and even if practicable, would but tend to our degeneracy. The operation of the Fugitive Slave Bill will induce many a panting heart to seek refuge on this soil. We shall rejoice over their escape, and aid them to secure the reward of industry in this haven; but the negro sho be taught that the legitimate field for his exertions is the land of Africa, and thither he should be counselled to turn his steps. Whatever knowledge of civilization he boasts, whatever his acance with the arts, the sciences, and literature, they can be invoked with far greater advantages for the progress of his own race on his own soil, than here or in the United States. He wastes his energies and his intellect when contending with a people who look upon him as an alien, and as a nu sance. 
