PETER BUCKLEY WOUNDED

After 11 months of life in the trenches, Pte. Samuel Buckley is now in the hospital suffering from wounds for the second time since his arrival at the front, according to information received here by his mother yesterday.

WEARING OF UNIFORMS.

Military orders to-day contain an abstract from an order in Council to the effect that if any unauthorized person wears any naval or military uniform calculated to deceive, or if any person supplies a uniform to anyone not a member of the navy.

A bullet struck him in the forearm and penetrated his back. He will likely recover. The men escaped. The attorney-generals department has been asked to assign a man to the case.

WELL KNOWN LAWYER DEAD.

Besides being a well known practising barrister in Toronto and at other places in Ontario, he was the author of several legal works. His widow, who was the thirteen child of the famous William Lyon Mackenzie, two sons and two daughters survive him. One son is Hon. W. L. M. King, minister of labor, in the Laurier Government.
