

CITY AND COUNTRY

From Thursday Morning's Leader. The license commissioners met in the city yesterday for the purpose of considering the various applications for licenses in this district.

June 1st has been fixed as the last date for receiving names in connection with the Young-Thomas soap name competition.

J. F. Blackstock returned yesterday from Saskatoon where he reports real estate operations to be extremely brisk. Among recent real estate deals in the northern city may be mentioned the sale of 100 feet on Third Avenue, between 20th and 21st streets, which on Tuesday changed hands for \$15,000.

The case of Charles Pohl, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses in connection with the sale of two lots in the Alexandra Annex, came up before Police Magistrate McCauland yesterday. After the evidence of the first witness, however, C. P. Wood, who appeared for the prosecution, intimated that he was satisfied that there was no case against the accused and that the prosecution did not wish to go on.

From Friday Morning's Leader. Colonel J. R. Orr, proprietor and editor of the Morning Review, is in the city. Colonel Orr is spending several weeks in the West sightseeing.

At the close of the prayer meeting in the Baptist church, Wednesday evening, the retiring pastor, Rev. H. G. Mellick, was presented with a gift of \$250.00 as a token of the esteem in which he is held by the church and congregation.

The remains of the late Father Gratton were yesterday removed from their late resting place at old St. Mary's Catholic church on Cornhill street to their new place of interment at the new church on Scarth street. In connection with the removal a service was held by Father Sufa.

Mayor J. W. Smith returned yesterday from Prince Albert, where he had been with the Municipal Commission, going on to that city from Saskatoon. During the week the commission will go to Abernethy, which, with the exception of drawing up the report, will complete the commission's labors.

From Saturday Morning's Leader. Large crowds on Thursday evening gazed interestedly at the only Chinese baby in the city, the child of Mah Po, which was at home in the window of Wright Bros. store.

Victoria Day passed very quietly in the city yesterday, there being very little doing beyond the fire cracker activity of the younger generation, the rather dull and threatening weather proving unattractive for venturing far afield.

In view of the Oddfellows' Grand Lodge to be held in the city next Wednesday and Thursday, and the likelihood that the hotel accommodation will prove insufficient for the many attending, those having the arrangements in hand would be pleased to hear from any in the city who could rent a room or rooms for the two days of the Grand Lodge. From Monday's Morning Leader. As the result of falling from a moving catbox, brakeman E. C. Evans was seriously injured at McLean on Saturday. The injured man was brought to the Victoria Hospital for treatment.

The Rev. Canon Cosgrave will give a lantern lecture on Thursday evening at St. Paul's Church Sunday School room, his subject being the "History of the Church of England." There will be a silver collection.

From Tuesday Morning's Leader. Considerable surveying work has been done in connection with the Parliament buildings site and the adjoining property which it is proposed to turn into an extensive park and the department of works is calling for tenders for the breaking of the whole tract of land.

Storey and Van Edmond, architects have awarded the contract for the erection of a school building at North Battleford to W. J. Broley for \$23,248.00. Mr. Storey is at present in North Battleford seeing up the contract. The same firm has also let the contract to C. J. Barrett, of Weyburn, for a school building at Hayward for \$10,750.00.

W. M. Graham, Inspector of Indian Agencies, arrived in the city on Saturday and leaves for the eastern portion of the province by this morning's local. While here he was a guest at Government House. In the course of yesterday he visited the Indian industrial school here. Mr. Graham is quite pleased with the prospects for a good crop.

Mr. Boyle, representative of the Bitulithic and Contracting Co., Ltd., draws attention to the following news paragraph which appeared in the Walkerville, Ont. Herald of the 17th inst.: "The bitulithic pavement on Wyandotte street is being broken in to lay the tracks of the Windsor and Tecumseh Electric Ry. The workmen say it is the hardest pavement to break through they have yet tried, and citizens who were opposed to the laying of the pavement now acknowledge that the Council of 1904 did not make any mistake in having it put down."

At the solicitation of the Kettle River Quarries Co., the cross-ties wood block pavements laid by that company last year were yesterday subjected to a very severe test. A 15-ton American Abell traction engine was run over the pavement without the slightest adverse effect to the pavement. Not only so but the big engine was brought to a standstill for some time on Scarth street and photographed, but the blocks showed no signs of sinking. At first the city fathers were loth to allow the engine to travel on the pavement, especially as traction engines are prohibited by-law from passing along paved streets but the Kettle River Quarries Co., guaranteed to repair any damage

to the pavement which might result. The test was, to quote Mayor Smith, "quite satisfactory." In order to reach the streets paved with cross-ties blocks it was necessary to travel down South Railway Road, which is paved with bitulithic. The Bitulithic Company expressed their willingness that this should be done and the bitulithic smoothed to the same quality as well as the cross-tie blocks.

CRAZED BY GIRL'S FACE

Philadelphia Man Fights to Abduct Stenographer.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 27.—Publishing a crowd of clerks, James Carroll, a carpenter, who suddenly became mentally unbalanced, dashed into the inner office of the Manhattan Life Insurance company today and attempted to abduct Miss Jennie Bray, a stenographer. "Carroll had gone crazy over that girl," he shouted. "I'm going over to get my girl." Carroll has been working for several weeks on a building at Fourth and Walnut streets, opposite the building in which today's episode occurred. At one of the windows in the latter the workmen have regularly observed the girl at her desk every day. Several times Carroll has said: "See that girl over there? Isn't she a daisy?" and has then hammered away chucking to himself. The other men took it as a joke until recently when one of them voiced the general opinion in the remark that "Carroll had gone crazy over that girl."

Finally he threw down his tools, saying: "I'm going over to get my girl." Brushing his clothing and fixing himself up as well as he could under the circumstances Carroll went downstairs. For the first time, the other men realized that he might be in earnest as they told the foreman who went after him.

Carroll went straight across the street and began a tour of the Manhattan building. When he reached the office he recognized "his girl" at once. Several clerks seeing the man's wild appearance tried to block his way, but Carroll bowled a couple of them over and rushed to where Miss Bray sat. Throwing one arm around the girl's neck and grasping one of her wrists with the other hand, Carroll gave a shout of joy. "I've found you at last," he cried, "my dear little girl. You are the only one I ever loved, or ever will. Come away with me."

With that the man tried to drag the amazed object of his affections from her chair, but she clung fast and screamed.

E. T. Tillman, cashier of the insurance company, attacked Carroll. There was a sharp scuffle, in which the rest of the office forces joined, but to no avail. The situation was becoming desperate, when two policemen and the janitor entered the room and overpowered the carpenter, who subsequently was sent to the Philadelphia hospital for the insane.

The victim of Carroll's demonstrative affection is a attractive blonde about 22 years old. She had never seen Carroll before.

A Murderous Attack

Attacked from behind with a sharp instrument, thought to have been a railway spike, Joe Folio, a young Pole, who is employed on the city works, was struck down by a fearful blow on the side of the head, about 12 o'clock last night on Jasper Avenue, near the Jasper Hotel. The blow was struck by a fellow foreigner whom he knew slightly. The victim of the assault was walking up the street with a young lady, when the murderous attack was made upon him. In a moment he dropped unconscious to the sidewalk and a few minutes later was taken to the police station, still in a dazed condition. It is thought he will recover. His assailant has not yet been arrested.

A NEW DEFINITION

Important Change Made in Criminal Code by Minister of Justice

WINNIPEG, May 27.—Mayor Ash-down today received from Hon. A. E. Aylesworth, Minister of Justice in Canada, notification that the clause in the criminal code dealing with houses of ill-fame had been amended. The clause now reads as follows: "A common bawdy house is a house, room, or set of rooms, or place of any kind kept for purposes of prostitution, or occupied or resorted to by one or more persons for such purposes."

A RISE FOR I. C. R. MEN

\$150,000 To Go To Increasing Pay of Employees

OTTAWA, May 27.—The department of Railways has \$150,000 which was voted last session to gladden the hearts of some employees on the Intercolonial Railway who have not yet received increases in their pay during the past two or three years. Among those who will share in this increase are certain classes of mechanics, clerks, mechanics and carmen. The Deputy Minister of Railways has not yet worked out the schedule. As soon as this is done the money will be paid out, and it may be taken for granted that the distribution will be made as fairly as it is possible to do it.

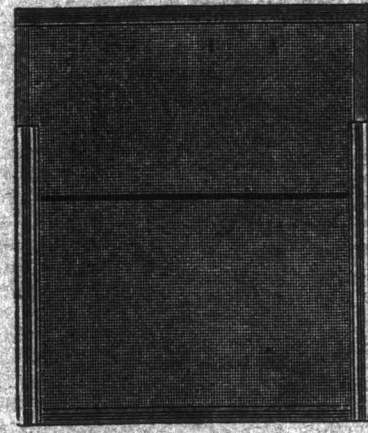

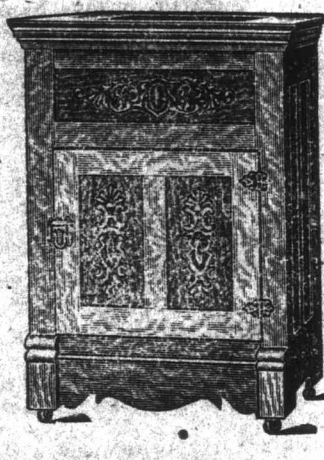

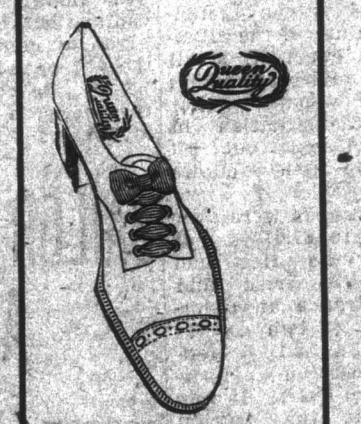
