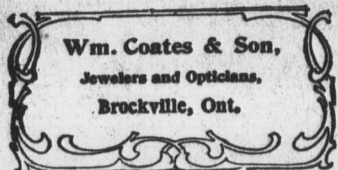


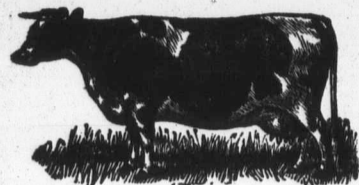

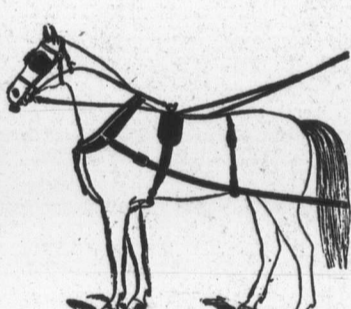
Notice to Creditors
