Wheat-Receipts are small in past week. Millers are good buyers for all offering at 66c. Large rail receipts are necessary to keep the mills going full time, and carloads are idaily arriving at the mills. Prices may be better as the season advances. Every-

one hoping so.

HENRY CLEWS' REPORT.

Henry Clews, in his weekly report to this journal, says :-The future of the stock market is still uncertain. In spite of large earnings and important negotiations no

mportant upward movement can be maintained in the face of the uncertainty about money, and the corn crop. The best that can be expected of corn is a yield of 1,300 to 1,400 million bushels. An early frost, however, would seriously injure late planted corn, upon which such a yield chiefly depends; so it must be re-membered that there is still great risk in the crop falling below these figures.

A loss of 600 million bushels or over cannot be ignored, even if largely compensated for by better prices and good crops of other sorts. The defi-ciency of the corn crop will be felt later on, the movement of corn or its equivalent in cattle not beginning until after the harvest.

MONTREAL LIVE STOCK.

Montreal, September 16 .- There were about 800 head of butchers' cattle, 40 alves, and 600 sheep and lambs offered for sale at the East End abattoir today. The butchers were out strong, and there was an active demand, and firm prices ruled for all good cattle, calves and lambs, but the supply of common stock was much too large for the demand, and pretty low figures had to be accepted in some cases in order to make sales. A few of the best cattle sold at about 41-2c per lb., but they were nothing extra; pretty good ani-mals brought from 3 1-2 to 4 1-4c, and the common dry cows and thrifty young stock at from 2 1-4 to 3 1-4 c per lb.; canners paid from 1 1-2c to 2c. per lb., for small bulls and lean old cows. Calves sold at from \$3 to \$12 each, efred for No. 2 Canadian yellow, and or from 3 to 51-2c per lb. Shippers paid 3 1-4c per lb., for good large sheep and the butchers paid from 3 to 3 1-2 per lb, for the others; good lambs sold ommon lambs at about 3 3-4c per lb. Fat hogs sold to-day at from \$6 to \$7.15 per 100 lbs., weighed off the cars.


