A BAD SHOCK

AT BITLIS

The Earthquake Was The Most Severe In Forty Years

EIGHT NATIVES KILLED

Constantinople, April 5.—The following despatch was received here yesterday from the Rev. Royal M. Cole, head of the American mission at Bitlis:—

At ten o'clock in the forenoon of March 29 there burst upon us unannounced the worst earthquake witnessed in forty years in these or the Erzerum volcanic regions. Such was its force that our city seemed to be in the jaws of some monster who would shake us into shreds, as a mastiff does his game.

Down came the plastering, the furniture was overturned, cracks were opened in strong walls, roofs were shattered and rain poured in. During the first day there were fourteen shocks, and they still continue. There have been altogether twenty-eight shocks. Of the 4,000 houses here over 300 have fallen, and half of the remainder have been seriously damaged, about fifty dollars to five hundred dollars being needed to repair each house. The officials report that eight persons were killed by falling walls, but they are all unknown in Bitlis.

Many persons were wounded, and many churches, mosques and Government buildings were damaged. The surrounding villages sustained heavy shocks, but it was in the day time, and so there was no great loss of life. The foreigners at Bitlis are the Russian Consul, Charlotte Ely, Lizzie Cole, and Miss Nellie A. Cole.

Famine prices prevail, and there is great poverty and extreme suffering.

STREWN WITH THE DEAD.

Roads of Roumania Are In A Terrible Condition.

Bucharest, Roumania, April 5.—Tranquility has been restored in most of the revolting districts. Disturbances, however, are reported from the Jalomca district, hitherto quiet; also from the Oltenia district. Troops from Moldavia have arrived in the Mehedinintze department, where the devastation has been widespread. The village of Operishoru has been bombarded.

Rabbi Moses Gaster states that his private advices indicate that the horrors of the Roumanian insurrection far exceed the accounts given in the press despatches. The newspaper correspondents, he says, have not been allowed to go out and see for themselves, but have been forced to put up with the official accounts. "I have just received a letter," said Rabbi Gaster, "from a person who witnessed a conflict between the peasants and the troops in one of the Wallachian townships. He writes me that the roads were covered with the corpses of peasants shot down by the soldiers by means of artillery as well as with rifles. The condition of portions of Wallachia must be terrible. The cheerful optimism of the authorities does not count much to me."

HIT AT THE RAILWAYS.

To Take Action at Instigation of Lord's Day Alliance.

Toronto, April 5.—At the suggestion of the Lord's Day Alliance, Crown Attorney Drayton will take action against at least two, and possibly three, of the Canadian railways.

These actions will be lodged to prevent making up trains on Sunday, shunting, forcing employees to work seven days a week, and unnecessary repair work.

A special effort will be made to secure relief for telegraphers. One case is reported of a man who has worked 15 years without a day off. To tag on the part of operators, many accidents were traceable.

Mr. English states that the winter has been very destructive to the San Jose Scale and it does not seem to be nearly so active this season as in former years.

There is also a good showing for the smaller fruits, and unless some set-back occurs, the fruit crop will be a very fair one this season.
