St. Petersburg, May 28.—Searches of the lodging of Social-Democratic deputies are now of almost daily occurrence here. The authorities have clues to several branches of the Social-Democratic organization, which have been conducting a special propaganda.

Officials of the secret police Sunday visited the apartments of Deputy Prikodko, Constitutional Democrat of Tchernigoff, and found documents showing that a railroad men's organization is making preparations for another general transportation strike at the proper moment. As soon as the investigation is completed the public prosecutor will demand the suspension of M. Prikodko, who is a railroad worker, in order to place him on trial.

A number of Socialist Democratic deputies who have been holding congress in London have arrived at Helsingfors to prepare for the return of the other deputies to Russia by way of Finland. They found that the Finnish police, under instructions from the Senate, were everywhere demanding the passports of those bound for the Russian frontier, making the repatriation of deputies most difficult.

WELCOMED IN FRANCE.

King and Queen of Norway Get Great

Paris, May 28.—The City of Paris was in holiday attire yesterday, in honor of the visit of King Haakon and Queen Maud of Norway, who arrived here on their way to England to visit the Queen's parents. All the public buildings and hotels, and many private residences, flew the Norwegian flag, intertwined with the tri-color of France.

They were received in state at the They were received in state at the Bois de Boulogne railroad station by President Fallieres, the presidents of the Senate and of the Chamber of Deputies, the Cabinet Ministers, the military governor of Paris, prefect of police and others, while massed bands played the Norwegian national anthem and the "Marseillaise."

Their Majesties were accorded a most cordial reception, the sight of little Prince Olaf arousing special enthusiasm.

Queen Maud afterwards took Prince Olaf to the Hotel Bristol, to see her mother, Queen Alexandra, who arriv-ed here Sunday night, incognito. President Fallieres last night gave Jinney of 300 covers at the Elysee a dinner of 300 covers at the Elyses Palace, in honor of the Norwegian

Dr. Haanel, Superintendant of Mines, was appointed director of the mines branch, and Mr. John Marshall, accountant of the Geological Survey, was appointed accountant of the new department. The position of director of the Geological Survey branch will not be filled at present, Mr. Low combining with the duties of Deputy Minister the work of director.

PACKERS GETTING EVEN.

Threaten to Raise Prices On Account of Inspection.

Chicago, May 28.—Meat prices in Chicago may jump skyward this week. The packers notified the commission firms that beginning yesterday they no longer would stand the loss on condemned cattle, and in order to protect themselves they had found it necessary to refuse payment on "cow stuff" until it had passed the Government inspectors.

Commission men declare it is the intention of the packers to enforce the rule with regard to "cow stuff" now in the hope that similar action may be taken later with reference to their purchases of sheep and hogs.

Some of the leading commission firms and shippers have communicated with the secretary of agriculture at Washington with regard to the new action on the part of the packers, and it is said assurances have been given that any attempt to delay payments on live stock, as threatened by the packers, would result in the withdrawal of the inspection service:

CANADIAN CHEESE SUFFERS.

Canadian Agent at Manchester Reports Low Prices.
Ottawa, May 28.—F. B. McNamars, commercial agent at Manchester, in a report to the Department of Trade and Commerce, notes the prevalence of low prices for cheese sales of Canadian product, having been made at sixpence. He observes that the reputation of Canadian cheese suffered somewhat last year from being shipped too green, and warns exporters that it is necessary that cheese should be adequately ripened before shipment.

DUNSMUIR'S CLOSE CALL.

British Columbia Governor's Long Journey In an Open Boat.

Vancouver, B. C., May 28.—Lieut.-Governor Dunsmuir narrowly escaped death on Friday through the burning of his yacht in Queen Charlotte Sound.

Mr. Dunsmuir was returning from a fishing expedition with his son-in-law, Major Audain, and three guests, when the yacht, the Thistle, was discovered to be on fire. Those on board, including a crew of thirteen, all took to the boats, and the yacht burned to the water's edge. Five hundred gallons of gasoline in the hold exploded. After traveling 32 miles in the boats the shipwrecked party were sighted by a southbound steamer, which landed them at Vancouver at noon Sunday. The Thistle was valued at \$50,000.

TRAIN WRECKERS AT WORK.

The train was composed of Pullman sleeping cars and heavy day coaches, and could not have been going more than 25 or 35 miles an hour when the headlight showed the rail lying directly across the track. One Dead and Several Others Unconscious From Gas.

Naples, May 28.—At Boscotresasse, on the southern declivity of Mount Vesuvius, a fissure suddenly opened Sunday, from which a flow of poisonous gas escaped.

A peasant, who imprudently approached the fissure, was killed, and nine others, who rushed to his reseue and fell apphyxiated, were saved with difficulty.

Eight Inches of Snow.

Sault Ste. Marie, May 28.—All points in the upper peninsula and Northern Ontario report a heavy fall of snow. Up to yesterday afternoon a fall of eight inches had been recorded, with no sign of abating. Shipping is tied up and it is impossible to see any distance. A high northwest wind is blowing from Lake Superior.

Paris, May 28.—Premier Laurier, received a deputation from the British Chamber of Commerce, and expressed pleasure at the foundation of a Canadian section by the chamber. Laurier will be entertained unofficially by the chamber on his return from Italy in June.
