## A DELEGATE'S DUTY.

A Government organ justly celebrated for the brilliancy and logical conclusions of its editorial columns has issued instructions as to the duties of delegates attending the Liberal convention. These are contained in a leading article and are so simple that it will be impossible for any delegate to misunderstand them.

The first duty before going is to deliberate very carefully on all questions that are likely to come up for But it is most important that this careful deliberation should not lead the delegates to form any definite views or convictions. Any opinions held before the convention must be of the interchangeable kind.

The reason for this is that "the intelligence of the Liberal party will be at the convention, presumably in the person of the Hon. Geo W. Ross, and it is most probable that no delegate will go there without obtaining new light. For in stance the party is crying out against corruption, but the new light which "the intelligence" will throw upon this question may prove that corruption is really progress. As in agriculture the rotting roots and other materials of a more or less savory description, provide the nourishment required for a new and glorious crop, so the corruption spread by Mr. Ross all over the province may be the work of a great and wise statesman, and the Liberal party will rise "on their dead selves to higher

things." Their private opinions thus being disposed of, the result will be the essence of Liberalism - that all delegates will go to the convention with open minds prepared to take what "the intelligence" after discussion, will show to be the best course for the party.
