CABINET MINISTER FOR WEST KENT.

The Ottawa Citizen says that Mr. Whitney is already gathering some strong cabinet material around him for the event, universally conceded, of his attaining power. Commenting on the same it says, "It is understood that it was on the earnest solicitation of the leader that Mr. James Clancy, ex-M. P., consented to re-enter provincial politics. In event of Mr. Whitney's attaining power Mr. Clancy will be offered a portfolio."

A DELEGATE'S DUTY.

A Government organ justly celebrated for the brilliancy and logical conclusions of its editorial columns has issued instructions as to the duties of delegates attending the Liberal convention. These are contained in a leading article and are so simple that it will be impossible for any delegate to misunderstand them.

The first duty before going is to deliberate very carefully on all questions that are likely to come up for discussion. But it is most important that this careful deliberation should not lead the delegates to form any definite views or convictions. Any opinions held before the convention must be of the interchangeable kind.

The reason for this is that "the intelligence of the Liberal party" will be at the convention, presumably in the person of the Hon. Geo. W. Ross, and it is most probable that no delegate will go there without obtaining new light. For instance the party is crying out against corruption, but the new light which "the intelligence" will throw upon this question may prove that corruption is really progress. As in agriculture the rotting roots and other materials of a more or less savory description, provide the nourishment required for a new and glorious crop, so the corruption spread by Mr. Ross all over the province may be the work of a great and wise statesman, and the Liberal party will rise "on their dead selves to higher things."

Their private opinions thus being disposed of, the result will be the essence of Liberalism—that all delegates will go to the convention with open minds prepared to take what "the intelligence" after discussion, will show to be the best course for the party.

It is a simple, innocent program, but it might be summed up in a single sentence, "Hold your tongues and do as you're told." In dismissing the convention it is not difficult to imagine "the intelligence" standing on the platform in the character of Justice in Boileau's celebrated fable of the dispute over the oyster: "The Premier weighing long the doubtful Right, Takes, opens, swallows it before their sight. The cause of strife removed so rarely well, "There take," says he, "take ye each a shell. We thrive at Toronto on fools like you, 'Twas a Yat oyster—live in peace—Adieu."

DESERTING THE SHIP.

Liberal journals used to say that a Conservative member refusing a renomination was a deserter from "the sinking ship." Now that the Ross Ship of State is in the Slough of Despond it may not be amiss to call attention to the large number of Liberal members who are deserting their Commodore in his dire straits at this time. Here are a few who seemingly do not care to be thrown overboard by an outraged electorate, and have announced their intention to desert their colors before the defeat, which is staring their pilot in the face, overtakes him and the party he is leading to destruction. Some of them will doubtless attend the post-mortem function at Toronto to-day, but they will go there simply as witnesses, and will not testify to the great upheaval which is bound to follow an appeal to the people, come soon or late.
