The fifteenth verse of the second chapter of Habakkuk is a double star in a constellation of cures.
Have you a bottle in your church? If this were communion Sunday, and the emblems were spread in your church, might the fumes of my old deadly enemy taint the sweet air of the sanctuary, and make it an accursed place to me?

I am talking to men who acknowledge the binding authority of the Bible, and especially such as feel constrained to do temperance work. The hand that holds a bottle cannot lift helpfully fallen men; the heart that consents to a bottle cannot feel helpfully for fallen men.

I am called to all parts of the country to help the churches to save some of the temperate men, and there is real sorrow because there is no great success. Dear friends, how can there be success when a large majority of the male membership of the church are consenting to saloons that damn twenty men while I preach one sermon?

Men say to me, "What we need is a great revival of religion," but I tell you there will never be a great revival in the country till Christian men repent in saloons, and save for their part in the liquor traffic under license laws. My own notion is we don't need a revival of religion so much as another kind.

Break the bottle at home! If I could call up all the spirits of lost men who have gone down in your city through drink, and form them into procession, what a line it would be! You'd have friends in it, and as we move through the streets, and another might raise his ghastly hand and say: "There, that's the house where I got my start, there is where I fell the last time, when I brought up in the morning!"

Break the church bottle! But they won't let you. Then what? Leave the church! No, but stand strong in the name of Jesus Christ, and in his spirit, too, and protest with all your might, and never pass it to another.

Break the public bottle! You c'n't! You never tried. You have tried to keep it corked on Sunday and election day—and failed. You have tried to keep it from drunkards and boys and Indians, but the drunkard was drunk yesterday, is drunk to-day, and will be drunk to-morrow, and for every drunkard that drops down, a boy starts in to fill the gap.

"How do you break the people's bottle?" You vote to break it. The ballot is the freeman's little blast set in the rock of error, hammersmithing it by slow and often imperceptible degrees. RUN IN POLITICS.

A Startling Fact.

The run power in the politics of the United States has become so great as to threaten the very existence of free government. "We must destroy the traffic or be destroyed by it," is the solemn warning of Joseph Cook to his countrymen. Already the saloons control the affairs of most of the large cities, and openly boast of their supreme power. Chicago has \$300,000 saloons, eighty per cent of which are managed by a few brewers. These brewers largely control the affairs of the city. In an address on Municipal Reform at the late Christian Endeavor Convention, Montreal, Dr. D. D. Barrett, of New York, said: "Let me tell you a startling fact. The drink shop threatens our liberty. In the city of New York there are 300 saloons; 5000, or more than half of the saloons, are under chattel mortgage, and these mortgages are, with scarcely an exception, held by a syndicate of about twenty men—brewers, distillers, and wholesale liquor dealers, control twenty votes, or 100,000 for the saloon syndicate. What, then, is the conclusion of the matter? The destinies of the American people are practically in the grasp of a group of less than twenty liquor dealers! Were it not for certain moral restraints put upon this formidable power by public sentiment, the outlook would be as black as midnight."

In 1892 there were arrested in London, Ont., 1272. Of these, 220 were under twenty years of age, and sixty under fifteen years!

In 1892 there were 8,991 persons brought before the Police Magistrate of Toronto. Of these 1,370 were under twenty years of age, and 693 under fifteen years of age! What a startling fact! In this Christian land of ours, and in what is by the way of pre-eminence called the "City of the Saints," over 6000 of children under fifteen years of age in the police court in one year; and all, with scarcely an exception, brought there through a glass drink. Father drinks, mother smokes, and the poor, half-starved children are thrust out on the street to learn in the night school of theft, profanity, blasphemy and dishonesty. And the drink traffic is growing rich on this carnage and destruction, and the politicians promise, and

the churches resist, and the people permit, and the carnage goes on, and the angels weep, and demons laugh, and perdition yawns, and souls go down. How long, O Lord, how long!

"O good authority, shall we, in the city of Hamilton, Ont., upwards of fifty licenses controlled by one brewer, and every person conversant with public affairs knows that the licensed liquor traffic is a powerful factor in our political life. It controls the party machinery from the ward meeting to the national convention. Candidates for office cringe and cover in its presence, and party leaders on both sides do it reverence."

The question is in place for every Canadian citizen: Shall the liquor power, with its dire and deadly influence, be allowed to rule our country, and ruin every influence for good? Or shall it be utterly destroyed?—*Hamilton Leaflet*.
