Lawns and Flower Beds.

At this season the preparation of lawns and flower beds is one which Leave Newcastle for Indiantown, at 6 a.n. calls forth much planning of ways and means; how, when and where to plant, and how trees, shrubs and vines shall be placed to produce the Leave Newcastle for Noble's Settle desired effect. Cut the bed in the lawn; never elevate or pile up soil for flowers above the level of the lawn; it is the surest way of killing plants by drought; keep the edge of the bed about an inch below the surface of the sod. sloping or elevating the bed slightly, towards the centre.
