GOT THREE YEARS. Convicted of Wholesale Marriage Swindles in Germany.

Berlin, Feb. 14.—A bogus American, "Colonel" Schiemangk, has been sentenced by the criminal court to three years imprisonment, the loss of his civil rights for five years after his release, and to perpetual police supervision, as well as to pay a fine of \$300. Schiemangk having been convicted of wholesale marriage swindles by means of advertisements, whereby he succeeded in obtaining considerable sums of money from women.

The evidence in the court showed that the man already had served terms in the penitentiary where he made the acquaintance of a notorious criminal, Amundus Hoppe, who assisted him in carrying out his schemes. The latter was sentenced to six months imprisonment as an accomplice.

W. C. T. U. LADY DEAD. Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 14.—Mrs. Clara C. Hoffman, president of the Missouri W. C. T. U., died at her home here last night after a long illness, aged 55 years.

To Help Macedonia St. Petersburg, Feb. 14.—It is expected that Russia and Great Britain will enter upon an agreement for joint action with regard to the situation in Macedonia and these two powers will be supported by France and perhaps Italy. Despatches received here from London indicate that a similar view is gaining ground there.

MARKETS and FINANCE

TORONTO MARKETS. Live Stock. The total receipts of live stock at the City Market, since Tuesday, reported by the railways, were 107 oxen, composed of 2,800 cattle, 1,071 hogs, 1,058 sheep and lambs, 220 calves and two horses.

The quality of fat cattle was better; that is, there were more good cattle offered during the last two days than for many weeks, but that is not saying very much, as the season of the year is now at hand when there should be many good cattle and fewer of the half-fat kind.

Exporters—the prices quoted for export steers ranged from \$5 to \$5.35 per cwt.; export hogs, \$4 to \$4.50. Butchers—Prime picked lots of butchers, \$4.50 to \$5.10; loads of good, \$4.50 to \$4.75; medium, \$4 to \$4.40; common, \$3.65 to \$3.90; cows, \$2.50 to \$4; canners, \$1 to \$2.

Feeders and Stockers—This week receipts of cattle were larger and prices got down to a lower basis. Messrs. Murry bought 20 head this week at prices ranging from \$3.25 to \$3.60 for good 750 to 850-pound steers, and \$3.00 to \$4 for good 1,000-pound steers.

Milkers and Springers—There was a fair trade for milkers and springers of good quality, but the common, light strippers offered as milkers were slow sale at low prices. About 75 to 100 cows changed hands at \$30 to \$50 each. One very choice Holstein springer sold at \$60.

Calves—The market for veal calves was again strong; that is, for good quality. Prices ranged from \$4 to \$7 per cwt. Sheep and Lambs—The market for sheep and lambs, especially lambs, was not as strong, but prices held fairly well. Export ewes, \$4 to \$4.50; yearling ewes and wethers for butcher purposes, \$4.75 to \$5 per cwt.; rams and ewes, \$3.50 to \$4 per cwt.; lambs, \$3.50 to \$6.75 per cwt.

Hogs—Mr. Harris quoted prices unchanged at \$3.15 for select, fed and watered, and \$4.00, f.o.b. cars at country points.

Farmers' Markets. The receipts of grain to-day were moderate, with price unchanged. Wheat steady, 100 bushels of goose-selling at 53c; barley steady, with sales of 500 bushels selling at 57c.

Hay in limited supply, with prices firmer; half a dozen loads sold at \$20 to \$22 a ton. Straw in nominal at \$15 a ton.

Dressed hogs are in fair supply, with light quoted at \$7.25 to \$7.50, and heavy at \$7.

Richard Turcotte, Well Known Cigar-maker, Dead. Dr. Philp Replies to the Police Magistrate.

Mr. Daniel Turcotte, who for the past five years had been an employee of the Hilda Cigar Company, passed away at his late residence, 30 MacNab street north, this morning, after an illness of eight months. Mr. Turcotte, who was 26 years of age, came to this city fifteen years ago from Peterboro. He was a member of the Cigar-makers' Union, and had served the union as president. He was also a member of Court Oronhyak-tekha, Independent Order of Foresters. Deceased was son of the late Mr. Daniel Turcotte, and was unmarried. He was well known and had the respect of everyone, and a young man of exemplary habits and a kindly disposition, which earned him friends everywhere. He will be much missed. The funeral will take place on Monday morning at 8.30 from his mother's home, to St. Mary's Cathedral, thence to Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

Mr. Westgate showed excellent views of the country from the coast to the headquarters of the mission field; also of the natives, their customs, mode of living and so on. He described the people as being in a very degraded state, but when once won, remarkably faithful and fairly intelligent. There are twenty missionaries in the field, which covers a wide territory and numbers half a million people.

To the Editor of the Times: Sir—Will you allow me to enter my protest against the appointment of another salaried official in the person of a plumber inspector. I do so as a citizen, a householder and one that has had considerable experience with plumbing and plumbers. Sir, it is a strange thing that this request should first come from the plumbers themselves. Why should they be so anxious to have some one appointed at the ratepayers' expense, to see that they do their work right? Have they lost confidence in their own honesty to do an honest job? But they have a little too thin; and they have now got the Trades and Labor Council to push the thing for them, so that it won't look so barefaced, and thus try to hoodwink the public.

It is simply another effort to enable the plumbers to get another close corporation. We know what they tried a few years ago, both here and in Toronto and all other towns throughout the Province; how it was proved before the courts that the plumbers conspired to muzzle the public that required their services. If there were an inspector appointed it would enable them to tighten the cords to accomplish their object. I think that most people will agree that their plumbing bills are large enough, without establishing a lot of red tapeism. What is more, sir, I believe that there are a few honest plumbers in the city of Hamilton that don't require a person to watch them do their work. I have found it so, and I believe others have, too. Then, why multiply expenses when we find it so hard to make ends meet? Especially expenses that there is no need for. Thanking you, Mr. Editor, in anticipation of your giving space to this warning. SALOONS CLOSED. But All is Quiet at Fairbanks, Alaska—Troops Present.

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 14.—A special cable to the Post Intelligencer from Fairbanks, Alaska, says: Marshal Perry yesterday received the following from the Department of Justice: "Military force ordered to Fairbanks. Meantime your duty is to protect law-abiding citizens without tenderness to law-breakers. The department expects you to use all necessary energy to preserve order, and arrest the leaders in any attempt at intimidation. Those molesting Russians must be arrested, using such force as may be necessary to accomplish this purpose. (Signed) Bonaparte."

Everything was quiet yesterday. Special deputies were organized into bands of ten under captains. Saloons are still closed, but may be allowed to reopen to-day if good order continues. Men arriving yesterday report no molesting on the trail. The Chamber of Commerce and the Arctic Brotherhood have officially expressed approval of the President in ordering troops to Tanana.

GERMAN EMPEROR. Turns Deaf Ear to Macedonian Cry "Come Over and Help Us."

St. Petersburg, Feb. 14.—The Novoe Vremya's announcement of Germany's action at Constantinople as embodied in the declaration of the German Ambassador, Baron Marschall von Bieberstein, that Germany intended to abandon the allies and proposed instead of adoption of the Sultan's counter proposals, which are tantamount to no reform at all, has created a sensation in diplomatic circles, and resulted in a lively interchange of views and inquiries in order to substantiate the extent of the truth of the announcement. It is realized that this portends the failure of all effort to alleviate Macedonia.

LOCAL OPTION APPEAL. Mr. Frank Morison, of the firm of Staunton, O'Heir & Morison, announced this morning that the local option appeal would be gone on with at the Divisional Court, in Toronto, on Monday of next week. If he is successful at that court he will then have the right to go to the Court of Appeal.
