

MONTREAL, WEDNESDAY, SEPT. 9.

By the Ships St. Andrew and John Barrow, London papers to the 20th, and Liverpool to the 20th July have been received at New York.

The intelligence from England is not apparently of much importance. The Municipal Corporation Bill chiefly occupied the attention of the House of Lords, and the Irish Church Bill that of the House of Commons.

For the opinions extracts of the late news which we are enabled to give, we are indebted to the New York Commercial Advertiser.

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At Greenock, on the evening of the 8th of July, the Earl Grey steamer, was lying at the Quay, on her way from Glasgow, to London.

The steamer, it is said, was forced to stop at a room with the Clarence steamer, when the whole roof of the boiler, cabin, and deck, were blown up into the air, and the beams, planks, and fragments scattered over the Quay and into the river.

There were about forty persons on board at the time of the accident, and the papers give the names of thirty-two who were either killed or injured.

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Belgium. A railroad is proposed to be constructed between Paris and Brussels, the estimated expense is about thirty millions of francs, or about fifteen millions of dollars.

It is said, that the project has been taken up by the Government, and that the Government, others of the fugitives, it is said, had passed through Frankfurt on their way to Bremen, where they intended to embark for the United States.

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It is now, however, enough of ambition and cunning in the Colony to take advantage of them.

When we are contemplating the province of the historians in the Missouri, who will, doubtless, descend on the blindness of his co-patriots for not doing forty years ago what they have done now, brought the Government to a stand, on account of the badness of the materials of one of its important parts, the House of Assembly.

The members of Convention are now holding a meeting at Three Rivers, to decide, as is supposed, upon the course of policy to be followed by them in the approaching Session of the Provincial Parliament.

When we stated yesterday that the author of the work from which we made an extract respecting the Executive Council, once held a situation under the Crown, we laboured under a misconception. The author of the work in question (Mr. A. STURDY) never held any such, although he has long been distinguished as an enlightened and independent legislator.

Today, at two o'clock, the competition in the game of Le Crues, &c. between two different nations of Indians, will take place at the Pavilion Course. Considerable amusement is anticipated.

A Presbyterian Church was opened on the 23d ultimo, in the Village of Verges, Township of Nichol, by the Rev. G. GALT, of Halifax. The rapidity with which villages rush up in the Upper Province receives illustration in the growth of that Verges. It is stated, that "this village already contains about a score of good dwelling-houses, with a large tavern, a store, a bakery, and a saw-mill, in full operation; whilst a great mill (greatly wanted in this district) will be at work in October. So much for the operations of the little more than eighteen months."

Lower Canada. The number of vessels arrived at Quebec late in the season, and the loss of the steamer, Saturday, 10,473 against the wind, was from the east and yesterday, and blew strong last night.

Upper Canada. We are to learn from the country that the late season has been very successful, and that the wheat crop is generally good.

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The first anniversary of the memorable day, on which slavery ceased in every colony of His Majesty, has arrived. Twelve months have flown most rapidly; and, except in the late instance of injury to cattle, which however had, as we are detested, no connection with the relations between master and servant, we may venture to say that the year has passed happily.

The appearance in our telegraph is that of a fine cloud, or halo, far less luminous than the aurora borealis, and which is rendered visible in small compass, provided they afford sufficient light. We employed only our lowest magnifier (50) and the fine light of this instrument, having an object glass of 5 inches, gives us great advantage over ordinary telescopes in observations of this kind.

United States. A BALLOON ADVENTURE. From the Lexington (Ky.) Intelligence, Aug. 25. The Accidents.—According to previous notice, Mr. Clayton made a beautiful ascent on the 5th of October. It was in general clear, or only slightly overcast, and the air was calm.

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
