Otherwise the Federal Parliament would be paralyzed in the exercise of its ligitimate functions by the action of a body hiving no jurisdiction in the premises. It must be borue in mind that the primary legislative jurisdiction in Canada is vested in the Parliament of Canada. The powers of the Province all Legislative in the Legislative the Provincial Legislatures

ARE SECONDARY ONLY, and exist by way of exception from the plenary grant of legi-layer functions to the Federal Parliaments, and they cannot therefore be paramount to it, though the provincial bodies may legislate on cert in subjects to its exclusion. That exclusive power, however, does not authorize them to withdraw from the operation of Federal laws any person or persons whom they may designate as necessary to carry out exclusively provincial legislation. Every Canad an subject owes as much obedieuce to Federal as he does to provincial laws, and neither legislature can absolve him from, or interfere with

him in, his duty to the other.
