



Every factory established is of advantage to Value in the farmer. The workmen who earn the wages must pay them out again and be large consumers of the products of the farm. If we allowed the Americans to send their wares and products free into Canada, our factories must be closed and our farmers would soon find our cities glutted with American beef and pork. In our factories, we, in many cases, take the raw materials, as in the case of sugar and cotton, and our own people have the profit of doing all the work necessary to place the products in the hands of the consumer.
