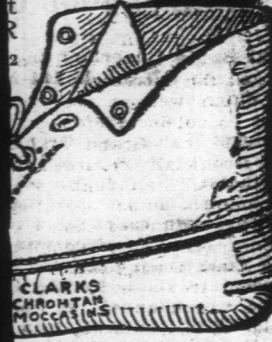

RAPID PROGRESS OF CANADIAN RAILWAYS

The Annual Statistical Report of the Controller at Ottawa Shows That the Year 1910 Was a Remarkable One for the Line of Development.

Ottawa, Dec. 19.—The annual report of Lambert Payne, controller of railway statistics for the house today, shows that the year 1910 established significant marks in railway development and operation in Canada.

During the year 1910, 271 miles of railway were under construction on June 30 last. During the year 79 miles of second track, and 344 miles of yard track and sidings were made available.

Cash subsidies during the year amounted to \$1,789,722, bringing up the total to \$146,932,180 by the Dominion, \$35,837,040 by the provinces and \$17,982,822 by municipalities.

The public service of Canadian railways was represented in the carrying of 25,594,575 passengers and 74,482,166 tons of freight...
