Now it is significant that the gold found in Victoria gulch is also crystalline and has the same characteristic outline, here then we have fairly convincing evidence that the gold found in a stream gravel is identical with that found in situ in a quartz at the head of the valley and in this instance there can be little doubt as to the origin of the gold."
