Death of Emperor William.

THE DRAWING ROOM POSTPONED.

Prince William Plays His Part.

THE CROWN PRINCE BETTER.

HALIFAX, N.S., March 9.

Emperor William is very low, and his death is expected at any moment. Yesterday his death was announced, but it proved a long swoon. [A later message has been received here announcing the Emperor's death.]

Queen Victoria postponed her drawing-room yesterday on account of the Emperor's critical condition.

The Imperial decree provides that Prince William will discharge the current Government business. The Crown Prince is better.

FROM GRAND BANK.

A Man Recovers from Terrible Injuries.

(Special to the Evening Telegram.)

GRAND BANK, This Afternoon.

Four weeks ago a man named Reuben Samms of Codroy fell from the masthead of the schooner *William Mitchell*, a height of fifty-four feet. In his descent he came in contact with the mainboom and sustained terrible injuries to his body and head, but no bones were broken. He has now fully recovered and is able to pursue his usual avocation.

General Northern Despatches.

Fogo, This Forenoon.

Yesterday numbers of hoods were observed at Tilton Harbor, but no seals have been seen here to-day. Wind east, blowing a moderate breeze and sky clear. The ice is still running into the Bay.

TWILLINGATE, This Forenoon.

Seals plentiful in the Bay, but our men cannot get off on the ice. Wind east and weather frosty.

GREENSPOND, This Forenoon.

Wind northeast and weather fine, with every appearance of a change. Bay full of ice. Barometer 30.

BONAVISTA, This Forenoon.

Weather clear and Bay free of ice. Wind east, blowing a strong breeze.

FROM CAPE RACE.

CAPE RACE, This Evening.

Wind E.N.E., blowing a fresh breeze and weather fine and clear, with a string of ice east of the Cape and running west. No vessels have been sighted to-day.
